KAISER AND CZAR.

As the Russian call their Czar the Emperor, and the Germans call their Emperor the Kaiser, the Americans call the Russian Emperor the Czar, and the German Kaiser the Emperor. The German William is pushing the mourning for the late Czar, who de-tested him. William is determined to be the biggest mourner that ever was. He cannot keep quiet a moment. A new order or speech or proclamation is out every day. It is rumored that William is going to St. Petersburg, and he would, no doubt, unless restrained by some cooler heads. The ponderous Alexander did not fancy the rampant state, which is the normal condition of the supernatural William, but William got the better of Alexander through young Nicholas, who had a boy love for the Princess Alix that it was thought would soon pass away. But when Nicholas was in Germany, pain were not taken to keep Alix out of his sight. At last Alexander discovered that the safety of the succession might depend upon the marriage of Nicholas and Alix, and William has been happy ever since, save when he has heard in some quarter the awful word opposition to his divinely appointed imperial will, as he regards and asserts it. The death of the Czar Alexander is, as William uses it, a special interposition of providence in his personal behalf, and the way to begin is to make the most of the mourning and hasten the wedding—then he says he must grasp the hand of Nicholas. William may overdo his mourning, and his lamentable eloquence, for there are some tough old Russians who have something to say, and the first thing they will warn the young Czar about is that he must not be made a monkey by the Kaiser.

Few readers of the daily newspapers have any idea how much they are indebted to that greatest of the many modern purveyors of news, the Associated Press, for the interest and satisfaction afforded by the columns of their favorite journal. From the pages of a neat little pamphlet recently sent to its members, we call the following

Illustration of the completeness and perfection of system to which that association has been brought by the tireless energy and enterprise of its present managers:

The Associated Press is a mutual organization of newspapers having for its purpose the collection and distribution of the important news of the world. There are 125 stock-holding members, 272 affiliated members, and about 1,700 newspapers served through minor agencies. For its more important service the Associated Press has its own leased wires which form a network across the continent from St. John, N. B., to Seattle and San Diego, Cal., and from Duluth, Minn., to New Orleans, Galveston and San Antonio, Tex. The total mileage of this leased wire system is: Day wires, 5,736 miles; night wires, 12,921 miles. From various points along the trunk lines, the report is sent to interior cities. Each of the members engages by contract to contribute the news of his immediate vicinage to the Associated Press and no other rival association. The annual revenues of the Associated Press, which are derived from assessments levied upon the newspapers served, exceed \$1,000,000, while the number of words daily received and transmitted at each of the more important offices is over 50,000, or the equivalent of twenty-five columns of the average newspaper.

Today the sub-committee will hold an adjourned meeting to consider propositions now before it. Whether they will take any definite action or not remains to be seen. It is said that there are several propositions before the committee, and it is hoped that each and everyone of them will be given a fair and impartial consideration. The party or parties who can first produce evidence that they are able to construct the road are the people to sign with. It is altogether probable that the man with the money on the ground will be the winner.

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS.

The next session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress will convene in St. Louis, on invitation of the Merchants' Exchange of that city, on Monday, November 26th, 1894, and will probably continue four days. This date has been selected with a special view of securing the attendance of the Western members of the United States congress en route to Washington for the re-assembling of that body.

Territory Embraced—The territory embraced in the representation to the congress includes all the states and territories lying west of the Mississippi river, and those small portions of Louisiana and Minnesota which lie east of it.

Objects—The object of the congress is to discuss all questions affecting the interests of the people in the foregoing territory, which may be the subject of legislation by the United States congress, and to express to it, through solicitation and otherwise, the sentiments of the western people. It will also endeavor to take such steps for the presentation of these resolutions to that body, as will command its attention and action.

Whatever tends to promote the interests of the Western states, and to increase reciprocal trade among them properly comes within the scope of its discussions.

Subjects of Discussion—While any such question may properly be brought forward for discussion, among those which are most likely to be prominent are: The Remonetization of Silver; Irrigation of Arid and other Lands; The Disposition of Indian and Public Lands; The Nicaragua Canal; A National Bankrupt Law; The Improvement of Western Rivers and Harbors; Anti-Option Legislation; Mining Laws; Admission of Territories to Statehood. Basis of Representation—The governor of each state and territory may appoint ten delegates.

Each county is entitled to one delegate, to be appointed by its commissioners or judges.

The mayor of each city may appoint one delegate, and an additional delegate for every 10,000 population; provided, however, that not more than ten delegates shall be appointed from any one city.

Each commercial body or business organization may appoint three delegates, and one additional delegate for each 100 members.

Ex-presidents of the congress, governors of states and territories, west of the Mississippi river, and all members of the United States congress are ex-officio delegates, with all the privileges of appointed delegates, except those of voting and election to office.
