DOORS CLOSED AGAIN. Portland Savings Bank Goes Into Liquidation.

The doors of the Portland Savings bank will not open for business this morning. For a second time in its history the bank has been unable to meet obligations, and Circuit Judge 118 Stearns has turned over its affairs to Judge O. N. Denny, whom he appointed receiver late yesterday afternoon. Lack of public confidence and a heavy and unremitting |withdrawal | of 'deposits are assigned as the reasons for closing the bank. No further effort will be made to open it, and the depositors will have to wait until the affairs of the institution are settled up before they can hope to realize on their accounts.

The following brief statement of the assets and liabilities of the bank was

times are taken into consideration, and indicates the character of the bank's necurities, and, generally speaking, of securities, and, generally speaking, of its assets. Every effort was made to save the institution from downfall, but, as the money was being demanded by depositors faster than the securities could be realized upon, the directors, at a meeting yesterday afternoon, re-solved to close the bank's doors in time to avoid another panie. Accordingiy, Cleveland Rockwell, in a suit for a nominal sum against the bank, appear ed before Judge Stearns yesterday af-ternoon and asked for the appointment ternoon and asked for the appointment of O. N. Denny as receiver. As Mr. Denny's appointment was satisfactory to all parties concerned, that gentle man was instructed to take charge of the affairs of the bank at the earliest possible moment.

The closing of the bank was undoubt edly hastened, and perhaps precipitated, by the death of Mr. Frank Dekum, the president, which occurred a month ago. Since the bank resumed husiness on May 1, the withdrawal of deposits was quite marked, but it developed almost into a run after the death of Mr. Dekum.
