THE NEXT CONGRESS.

The Republican congressional committee has published a corrected list of the representatives elected to the Fifty-fourth congress. It shows that 245 Republicans, 195 Democrats, and 6 Populists were returned and will receive certificates of election, so that the Republicans will have more than two-thirds majority over the combined opposition.

On the list is also noted the names of those in whose notice of contest has been served or will be served upon the candidates returned elected. An inspection of the list shows that of the Republican representatives-elect, 96 are members of the present congress, while 27 will succeed Republicans, 116 will succeed Democrats, and 6 will succeed Populists.

Of the Democrats returned, 75 the members of the Fifty-third Congress, 29 will succeed Democrats, and 1 will succeed a Republican. The Populists gain one in Alabama, and 2 in North Carolina. The only Republican candidate who was defeated for re-election was Mr. Murray, the colored member from South Carolina, and he will contest the seat of Elliot, the Democrat, on the grounds of fraud.

An inspection of the list shows that the chairmen of only 20 of the 56 committees of the present house of representatives will be members of the next house, 21 having been defeated at the polls, while 15 were not candidates for re-election.

This alone indicates that the minority in the next house will be weak in point of ability as well as numerically. Not a Democrat who is a member of the present congress was returned from New England, only one, (Mr. Bartlett) from New York, one from Pennsylvania (Mr. Erdman), and none from New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, or West Virginia.

Ohio returned only two, one of whom was elected to fill a vacancy in the present congress, and Illinois only one—Mr. McCann, of Chicago—who has never cut much of a figure in the house. The states of Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Wyoming and Wisconsin, will be entirely destitute of Democratic representation, while California will have only one Democratic representative, and the combined pluralities of the two Democrats returned from Illinois will not exceed 500, although the Democratic gerrymander was designed to give the Democrats fifteen of the twenty-two congressmen.

The speech recently made by Mr. M. W. Howard, the Populist congressman-elect from Alabama, and the first candidate in twenty years to beat the organized Democracy of that state, is significant of the change of sentiment among the people in some sections of the South. In commenting on the causes that contributed to his election, he said: "So long as any section of this country remains solid on sectional lines or sectional feeling, just so long is it a menace to the country as a whole. No longer in the South shall we vote for that which is mouldering. The issues are now the issues of business." Further along in his speech he showed himself an ardent protectionist, by asking "What good is it for a suit of clothes to be cheap if a man has not a penny to buy it with? Men are voting now for themselves, for their wives and for their children, not for politicians and ringsters. When a man

is selling his cotton for 5 cents a pound and his wheat for 50 cents a bushel, he is not going to stand on sentiment very long. I'd rather have the tariff higher and have money to buy things with than have no money. I'd rather see the mills running and the spindles turning than see 4,000,000 people in poverty and misery."

The German government shows a disposition to submit the case of the importation of American cattle to experts which will probably result satisfactorily and again make wide the ways of the emigrating transatlantic steer. The trade in live stock of this sort with Germany has not hitherto been overwhelmingly large, only 17,321 having been sent thither during the five years beginning with 1890. But it is likely to increase if things go well and no occasion arises in our tariff legislation to trump up a case against us under cover of which a reprisal may be instituted. The tax on sugar levied by the last congress affected one of the largest German exports to this country, that of sugar, which in the three years named exceeded \$100,000,000. At the same time our exports of meat products were \$49,000,000, of which \$37,000,000 for the single article of lard, and of breadstuffs, \$27,000,000. In comparison with these commodities, the steer trade is rather light, but it is worth looking after and protecting, and will very likely be re-established again on its old footing.

Referring to Mr. Charles W. Fulton's position as a possible senatorial candidate, the Oregonian of yesterday says: For years past he (Mr. Fulton) has been a conspicuous figure in Republican politics. He came into prominence as a member of the joint committee of the legislature that laid bare to the people of the state the doings of the Grover administration, and was then—in 1875—the youngest member of the senate. So far back as 1854 he was regarded as a senatorial possibility—during the legislative session when Solomon Hirsch was a candidate for senator, and when an adjournment followed with no choice for senator being made. At the last session of the legislature he was chosen to preside over the senate, and later had a strong following for the nomination of governor, in which he was defeated. Mr. Fulton appears to be making no canvass for the position of senator, but friends are not only urging him to be a candidate, but have taken active measures in his behalf. They claim not only the representatives from Clatsop and Columbia counties, but also a majority of the Eastern Oregon legislative members and others scattered over the state.

The country wants a rest, and business men can be assured that there will be no tariff legislation this session. The Republicans, though they have not the power to enact legislation, can prevent it by dilatory tactics, and such filibustering as is permitted by the senate rules, and they will do so.

DUANE STREET IMPROVEMENT NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, Oregon, have determined to improve Duane street from the east side of 16th street to the west side of 12th street, except the crossing of 11th street, all in the City of Astoria, as laid out and recorded by John McClure and extended by Cyrus Olney, by removing all defective piles, caps and stringers, and putting in new and sound fir piles, posts and sills wherever necessary, and new caps and stringers, and planking the same with new and sound fir plank four inches in thickness, and by building sidewalks on both sides thereof; all of the improvements to be made to the full width and established grade of said street, and to include railings where necessary, and to be done in accordance with plans and specifications and ordinances in relation thereto.
