ASTORIA'S AWAKENING.

The contract that our faithful and indefatigable railroad committee have now to show is well worth the cost of the toilsome efforts, the patient waiting, and the successive disappointments they have endured.

Who can estimate the events that will surely and rapidly follow the signing of this veritable declaration of independence to Astoria? Who doubts that the news of her prospective emancipation—flashed last evening to the remotest town and hamlet of America—will produce effects stupendous and surprising even in advance of the completion of the iron bonds destined to soon connect her with the world's commerce and trade?

Now, indeed, have the people of Astoria a right to feel encouraged. Now have they the coveted chance to demonstrate their possession of the genius, energy, and determination to place their city in her rightful rank among the sister cities of the Northwest. Her rivals all admit the advantages of her location, now let them see that she has the people necessary to the development of her advantages, and Astoria will unquestionably become one of the greatest cities in the land.

While the names of such men as Bonner, Hammond, Stanton and Kimball, linked as they now are with the destinies of Astoria, may accomplish much in attracting the attention of capital and brains of the right sort to the city, yet it must be remembered that it is upon those who are now, rather than those who may hereafter become her citizens, that the start upon the road to prosperity and progress depends.

The task of the committee of twenty-one has only had a successful beginning. It is necessary that some judicious and systematic course of advertisement should be at once devised and put in operation. Let the organization of the committee be continued, and let them follow up the good they have shown themselves capable of doing by undertaking the work of proclaiming and explaining everywhere the boundless resources of Astoria as well as the good old state of Oregon.

MR. SCHUYLER'S REPORT.

With the settlement of the railroad question, and in the belief that our water supply is now more than ever a most important subject for public consideration, we present our readers this morning the complete report of the consulting engineer, Mr. James D. Schuyler, on the plans and estimates for the city's new water service.

The wisdom and prudence shown by the water commission in thus procuring the opinion of so eminent an au-

thority in the science of hydraulic engineering, before finally deciding upon the plans and specifications and beginning the actual construction of the work, will be appreciated and commended by all taxpayers; and it will be a source of as much satisfaction to them, as it is a deserved compliment to the professional skill of Mr. A. L. Adams, that Mr. Schuyler so cordially approves and recommends the adoption of the entire plan and system devised by Mr. Adams—with the suggestion merely of enough modification in some of the minor specifications to prove their careful examination at his private residence and reliability river.

It is sufficient, therefore, to say that the most timid and doubting mind will be satisfied from the plain demonstrations of Mr. Schuyler's report, not only that the present need and prospective growth of the city renders the new works an imperative necessity, and that we shall have in their completion a water supply ample for many years to come; but more important still—without relying on the increase over the present rate of consumption, it appears that the new works can be made to produce an income, exclusive of the cost of repairs and maintenance, sufficient to pay the interest on all bonds it is proposed to sell, besides creating a sinking fund entirely adequate for their redemption when due.

There is certainly not now left to the Commission any further excuse for delay in proceeding with the work they were appointed to do, and the people have a right to expect from them some showing of immediate and positive results.

The original draft of the contract between the subsidy committee and Messrs. Bonner and Hammond was made by Miss Rice, the well-known stenographer for Elmore, Sanborn & Co., in the office of that firm yesterday. It is hoped the young lady has a due appreciation of the distinction thus conferred upon her.

Mr. James D. Schuyler, the Water Commission's consulting engineer, has been connected with some of the largest irrigation systems ever constructed in this country. He also planned the famous water supply at Denver, and is now consulting engineer and in charge of the new water works at Portland.

It is due to Messrs. L. B. and E. A. Seeley, to say their courtesy, with the accommodation of the steamer Telephone's people, has contributed not a little to the successful termination of the railroad committee's labors.

The electric light plant in connection with the new water works will prove one of the most profitable and important adjuncts of the whole system.

Mr. A. Adams has introduced a number of ingenious and original devices in planning the new water system.

Dr. Kinney claims the credit of having interested Messrs. Bonner and Hammond in Astoria.

FIFTEENTH STREET GRADE NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, propose to establish the grade of Fifteenth street, in the town (now city) of Astoria, Oregon, as laid out and recorded by J. M. Shively, from the north line of Commercial street, to a point 140 feet north of the said north line of Commercial street, at elevations above the base of grades for the streets as established by Ordinance No. 71, entitled "An Ordinance establishing a base of grades for the streets of the City of Astoria," as follows, to-wit: At the north line of said Commercial street, 19 feet. At a point 140 feet north of the north line of Commercial street, 15 feet. The grade to be of even elevation throughout the width of the street at any one point and upon a straight line between the points above designated. 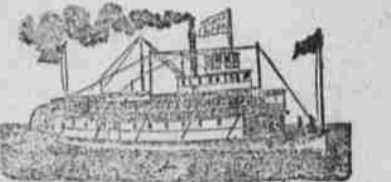
