### THE ROAD TO THE SEA.

Active Work on Astoria Line Begins Next Spring.

The Projectors Say the Money is Ready and They Will Push Construction With Rapidity.

(Oregonian.) Mr. J. C. Stanton, of New York City; Mr. H. I. Kimball, of Atlanta, Ga., and Mr. A. B. H'ammond, of Missoula, Mont, all of whom are interested in the agreement just entered into for the construction of a railroad from Astoria and a connection with the Northern Pacific road, at Gobel, left last night for the East over the O. R. and N. line.

The construction of the long-projected line of railroad from Astoria eastward to connect that seaport city with the northwest metropolis, appears to be now an assured fact. While it was announced in the press dispatches that the contract had been signed by A. B. Hammond, that gentleman is only one of several who are interested in the enterprise. His associates are his partner, E. L. Bonner, of Missoula, Montana, J. C. Stanton, H. I. Kimball, and J. T. Campbell, of Detroit, Mich.

The name of the new line will be the Columbia River and Astoria Railway Company, and its completion may be expected within another 'year. Mr. Stanton, who has been the moving spirit of the project for the past year and a half, is one of the pioneer railroad builders of the United States, his operations extending through all the New England and many of the Middle, West, and Southern states, during the past 50 years. Speaking of the Astoria road -his latest project-he said to an Oregonian representative yesterday:

'You may rest assured that the road will be constructed as rapidly as possible. With the exception of about 13 miles the right-of-way has been obtained, and there will be no trouble in obtaining the remainder. The line has been fully surveyed and located by Mr. W. H. Kennedy, now chief engineer of the O. R. and N. Company. In all probability he will occupy a similar position with our company. Very little time has yet been devoted to the discussion of details, but undoubtedly Messra, Hammond and Bonner will transfer their contract to a construcgion company, to which the work of the rullway company will also be transfewed. This construction company will also have the full management and improvement of the lands granted as a

"The contract entered into provides shall be at Astoria, and all disburse- Laighton. mersts shall be made at that place. The estimated cost of the road, including the purchase of the Seashore road, just made, will be about two millions of dollars, and other improvements in contemplation will necessitate the expenditure of five times as much. While we are given 23 months in which to complete the road, in all probability the work will be completed with in a year from the time of commencement The people of Oregon doubtless fully understand the unwisdom of building railroads during the winter months, and so far a sstarting the work is concerned, we will make haste slowly.

"Active operations will commence early next spring, about March, I think, and, when we begin work, we hope to find the needed labor here in Oregon. It will give employment to a great many laborers, while the construction is carried forward, and we are in favor of giving the work to those who may be unemployed at the time. So far as Chinese labor is concerned, I experimented with that once in the South, and it was not satisfactory. If suitable white labor can be procured, we will certainly give it preference.

"I hope to return to Oregon in about one month, and remain as long as my presence is required. This is my sixth visit to Portland during the past 18 months, exclusively to this business; so you see that I do not consider the trip across the continent ahardship, I do not expect to remain in Oregon during all the time, but hope to be able to do my part from the East. Only today I received a telegram stating it was desired to have me appointed as receiver of one of the Russell Sage roads in Massachusetts, but I will have
