

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS—

December Term, 1894.
Compiled by F. I. Dunbar, County Clerk, by order of the County Court.

In the County Court, Monday, December 3d, 1894, 1st day December term: Present, Hon. J. H. D. Gray, Judge; R. M. Wood and C. Peterson, Commissioners, F. I. Dunbar, Clerk, and J. W. Hare, Sheriff.

Court met at 10 a. m., and was duly opened. D. A. McInnis appeared and asked the Court to cancel Tax Sale to County Judge, of land assessed to H. O. Spear in 1892, as he has purchased the land under foreclosure of mortgage, and paid taxes on the mortgage. Ordered that on payment of the taxes and costs he be allowed the 30 per cent redemption, and that the clerk remit the same.

Condensed report of F. L. Parker, A. Bergman and W. B. Adair read. Ordered placed on file and published with the proceedings. The report is as follows:

As to Ex-County Clerk, C. J. Trenchard—Balance due county, \$961.57. Of this amount, \$903.00 is for court trial fees which should have been collected unless otherwise ordered by the court (and no such instructions appear on the journal), and \$58.57 short collections on delinquent taxes.

The accounts of the ex-treasurer were found correct, as checked with the receipts and cancelled warrants on file with the county clerk, and he has turned over to his successor the balance of the funds on hand, in amount, \$3,798.44.

The indebtedness of the county, on July 1st, 1894, as represented by outstanding, or unpaid warrants, is \$73,695.52, which is \$5,982.06 less than reported by the county clerk on that date. This represents an apparent saving, annually, in interest of \$1,324.63.

The unpaid warrants are distributed among the years of issue as follows: 1887 and 1888, \$35.15; 1888 and 1889, \$28.80; 1889 and 1890, \$4,064.42; 1890 and 1891, \$3,164.04; 1891 and 1892, \$16,128.09; 1892 and 1893, \$19,929.04; 1893 and 1894, \$29,225.98.

W. Reith, N. Winzer, and Will Heckard appointed viewers to meet at school house at Heckard's landing December 11th, 1894.

In the matter of the petition of C. E. Libke et al. for county road. The Court having ascertained that the costs of locating the starting point of the proposed road would be \$75.00, and believing that the starting point should be changed, it is ordered that the order heretofore made allowing said petition and appointing viewers be vacated and set aside.
