NAME THEM.

If the members of the city Republican committee know of any Republican now receiving or looking to the party for future favors, who is working to defeat the party's regular candidates for councilmen, why did they not include the name of such person in their resolution yesterday? With a resolution in that form (preceded by a proper preamble), regularly adopted and made a part of its record, not only the present committee, but those which may hereafter at any time succeed it would be in a position to prevent the imposition upon the party of such renegade in future.

This is a free country, and every citizen has of course a perfect right to work and vote for any candidate seeking public office he chooses. In fact it was out of contention for just such rights—among other constitutional privileges—that Republicans wore uniforms and fired muskets many years ago. But the abstract rights of all Americans, and the fealty (so indispensable to its perpetuity and the enforcement of its principles) due from the particular and voluntary members of a party organization, are two very radically differing propositions.

A certified copy of a resolution of the kind indicated may be a very handy and potential document when the next dispensation of favors is due from Washington or Salem. How would it do to try your hand at "resolving" again, gentlemen of the committee?

CHINA'S LOST OPPORTUNITY.

It is pleasant to see the rural press taking an interest, not only in affairs at their own doors, but also those transpiring abroad, especially when the shrewd eye of business detects possible opportunities for our home industries to put in a leg now and then. Thus an Eastern contemporary, and a good Republican paper, too, has a suggestion as to the defense of Peking, which, if carried to Li Hung Chang, may yet avail the Celestials much, while at the same time benefiting a "drooping" industry here, to wit, the iron and steel industry.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that on the 12th of December, 1894, a general election will be held in the city of Astoria, Oregon, for city officers, namely: One councilman from each ward. There is hereby set off and established for the purposes of the said general election of Precinct Numbered Four on day of December, 1894, the following election precincts, to-wit:

WARD NUMBERED ONE. Precinct numbered one be and the same shall embrace all of the city of Astoria west 7th street in said city as laid out by John McClure and extended by Cyrus Olney and as recorded and laid out by Hustler & Aiken.

Precinct numbered Two—All of the City of Astoria bounded on the west by 7th street in McClure's, and Hustler & Aiken's Astoria, and on the east by the eastern boundary of Ward Numbered One.

BOND STREET IMPROVEMENT NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, Oregon, have determined to improve Bond Street from the west line of 43d street to the east line of 4th street, all in the City of Astoria, as laid out and recorded by John Adair, by grading to the full width of said street so much of said portion thereof, as is of greater height or elevation than the established grade thereof, and by laying sidewalk 10 feet wide on the north side, railings where necessary, all to be done in accordance with plans and specifications and ordinances in relation thereto.

The lands and premises upon which the special assessment shall be levied to defray the cost and expense of said improvement and the district embracing the said lands and premises be and the same are designated as follows, to-wit:

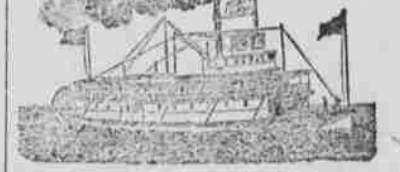
