For instance, under the present system a taxpayer may be assessed as owner of 1000 head of horses, and, when the tax is due and payable, he no longer has these horses, having in the mean the collection of the tax which was levled upon these horses, cannot be enforced by jevylag, schring and selling any other property of which the person may be possessed. The master of providing for the payment of all taxes with gold and silver coins, and not accept county warrants in payment, was discussed favorably, but no bili was formulated by the judges, but instead the subject will be left to the wisdom of the legislators.

An amendment to the probate law is to be recommended to the legislature, governing the compensation of adminastrators. Under the existing law a man dies and leaves an estate worth \$12,000. of which \$2000 consists of personal property and \$10,000 in real estate, houses and lots. The real estate is free of debt, and is devised to the widow and the \$2000 personal property is divided up among several heirs, and a few small debts are settled up. As the estate is worth \$12,000, the administrator has to give a bond of \$24,000, and is entitled to a per centage as allowed by law, for his work, on the whole value of the estate. The only part of the estate which he handles is the personal-properry portion, of \$2000. He does nothing with the \$10,000 worth of real estate, mave to see that it is transferred to the widow. According to the existing law the administrator or executor is allowed his percentiage on this \$10,000 at a certain per cent per thousand, amounting to several hundred dollars. The amendment proposese to change this, and is designed to permit the paying of per cerifiques to be discretionary with the county judges, who may allow in some cases, where there is some care of the real estate.

An amendment is also proposed to the same law, so that in a case of this kind, where an administrator only handles the perosnal property, the bond given by the administrator or executor shall only be in double of the value of the personal property, and not donble of the value of the whole estate Where rents and incomes of the property is to be collected, the bond shall also be made to cover such collections.

SHERIFFS WANT MILEAGE,

The Oregon Association of County Sheriffs met in special session Wednesfay at A. O. U. W. Hall, in Portland to consider the question of taking measares to have the new law placing sher iffs upon the salary system amended so us to provide for mileage and other expenses attached to the serving of papers at a distance from the courthouse

The complaint made by the sheriff is that papers have to be served mile away from the courthouse and count; seats, and no provision is made in the new law for mileage or expenses in curred in such service. A sheriff has to pay railroad fare or horse hire, and tall expensese that are entailed when he has to make service at a distance. Some of the county courts, recognizing the justice of these claims, have allowed mileage to cover expenses, but others stick to the law as it is, and will not

Instances were cited where sheriffs expended \$500 and \$600 travelling over their county summoning jurors and witnesses to abtend a session of court. This came out of the officials' salary, amounting to \$2500 a year, and many such trips would exhaust a sheriff's salary. The new law allows none of the sheriffs fees or mileage.
