T. M. Ländville, formerly of Astoria, but now a prosperous farmer of Tillamook county, has been in the city for several days, on a visit to his brother, Mr. Thos. Linville. "We are strictly a dairying community," said Mr. Linville, in speaking of his locality, "and I think I am safe in saying that there is no other part of the whole country where such a great average of butter can be had from the same amount of milk as in our county. The bottom lands produce a rapid growth of rich grass, and the prairie kamis a grass that, while not quite as heavy, is firmer and more nutricious. It is found that cows feeding on the

"How many dulrying establishments have you?" asked the reporter.

"Two, a private firm, and a co-opera-tive dairy. The latter I consider the only successful way of conducting this class of business, as has been clearly demonstrated in the present instance.

We have a market in Portland, Asto-We have a market in Postland, Astoria and San Francisco for all the butter we can make, and our business is constantly increasing. The milk is tested once each week with a Babcock tester, and the farmer charged at the rate of four cents per pound for making. If the market price is too low, the butter is simply stored away before working day of Dec and kept until the price comes up." "How about poultry in your county, Mr. Linville; is it as successful a busi-

ness as dairying?" "Paultrry has not as yet been tried as extensively as dairying. Two or three have gone into the business, with apparently great success. One man
