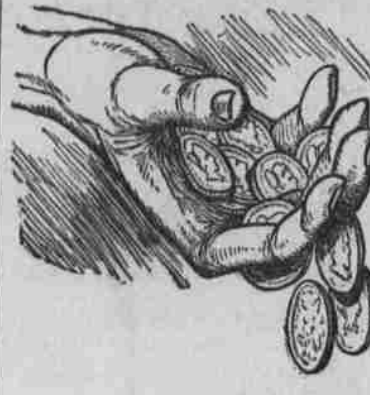

One Hundred and Fourteen Measures Introduced.

THE SENATE ADJOURNS EARLY

Several Fish-Protecting Bills Were Introduced—Bill to Relieve Clatsop County.

Salem, Jan. 17.—Both houses of the legislature adjourned today until Monday afternoon. In the house the Monday afternoon was given up to the introduction of bills. In all, 114 were introduced.

THE CALIFORNIA WRECKED.

San Francisco, Jan. 17.—The remains of the California, the first steamship that brought the earliest crowd of gold seekers to California, are strewn along the beach of Paeasayo on this coast.

NEW INSURANCE UNION. San Francisco, Jan. 17.—All insurance managers but two have signed the new compact of the board of fire underwriters, succeeding the Pacific Insurance Union, which went to pieces recently when fourteen out of eighteen managers withdrew.

ANACORTES BANK FAILS. Seattle, Jan. 17.—An Anacortes special to the Post-Intelligencer announces the failure of the First National bank, the only bank in the city.

CLATSOP CITY NOTES. Mr. J. C. Adams has moved to his new house.

On Saturday evening the Clatsop Literary Society will debate the question, "Resolved, That the banking system of the United States is an injustice to the people."
