TEACHERS' INSTITUTE. The First Day's Session Was Well Attended. The first day's session of the Teachers' Institute opened at 9:30 a. m. yesterday with the following teachers present: Prof. Wright, Misses Badollet, Busey, Grant, Sayre, Nickerson, McKean, Dealy, White and Sovoy, of Court Street school; Mr. Jackson, Mrs. Krager, Misses Nellie Nickerson, Joste Dealy, Laws, and Dickenson, of Cedar Street School; Prof. Clark, Misses Powell, Campbell, Fossitt, and McCue, of Uppertown school; Prof. Williams, Miss Alderbrook, Miss Foster, of John Day's; Prof. Brower, of Young's river; Mr. Campbell, of Silpanon; Mrs. Campbell, of Warrenton; Mr. Case, of Seaside, and Mr. Prescott, of Clatsop.

Supt. Lyman made a few introductory remarks, concerning the teacher's work, and gave a general statement of the ends to be aimed at in this institute.

A narrative of school work was then given by the representatives of the various schools. The speakers were as follows: Messrs. Wright, Jackson, Clark, Williams, Brower, Campbell, Case and Prescott; Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Campbell.

President Chapman spoke of school work in general. "The New Education," was the subject of a discussion by Profs. Wright, Clark, and Brower, and President Chapman.

The afternoon session was opened with an essay by Mrs. Busey, upon the subject, "The Dynamics of History."

Discussion: "What is Thought, and How May It Be Developed?" T. J. Jackson and C. C. Brower.

Essay, "How the Will of the Pupil may be Developed," Miss Flora Weed.

Essay, "What is there in School Work to Develop the Morality of the Pupil," Prof. Williams.

The institute was well attended, and all seemed to enjoy and profit by the papers and discussions.

The session today will be opened at 9 o'clock a. m., as announced on the program.

THE NEW MILL WILL HAVE A CAPACITY OF 50,000 FEET PER DAY. The Nehalem Lumber Co., successors to the Nehalem Mill Co., will soon be one of the big lumber concerns of the coast, and this coming season will undoubtedly note great changes in the monthly output of lumber from that river.

The new company will soon ship to their Nehalem mill new machinery which will increase the output to fully 50,000 feet per day.

A complete box factory will be a feature of the improved plant. The mill is situated on a pretty little island, so that logs can be brought down on one side and the lumber loaded onto schooners from the other side.

For logs, the mill draws from one of the greatest timber belts on the coast, being principally spruce. The supply is inexhaustible, and at the present time the mill has contracted for logs 50 miles up the river.

Mr. C. H. Callender, of Knappton, is manager of the new mill, and being a practical lumber man, the future of the new enterprise is practically assured.

The company owns about half the town of Nehalem, and in addition to the mill, will conduct a large general store at that place. The principal market will be San Francisco, and the general offices of the company will be in this city.

I find that owing to the short time I had to make out my report, filed January 7th, 1895, after receiving the report of the county clerk, that I charged the item for advertising delinquent taxes 1895, twice, viz. in the orders drawn to pay debts contracted for June, 1894, \$1,789.17. To correct this error, deduct \$2,317.72 charged in the above amount from the total debit July 1st, 1894, in my former report, viz., \$110,251.69, which will leave our debt prior to July 1st, 1894, and estimated interest thereon, \$107,917.97.
