Concomly Tribe, No. 7, I. O. R. M., held a meeting last night in Pythian Castle.

The steamer Hayward arrived down yesterday with the Clackmannanshire in tow.

The Grassendale, in tow of the Hayward Queen, left up the river Sunday afternoon.

The steam schooner Alice Blanchard arrived in San Francisco yesterday from this port.

Just at present quite a number of men find employment cutting wood on the various streets.

The American ship Standard sailed yesterday for Liverpool with 33,223 sacks of wheat valued at \$26,057.

The big barge under construction at Martin's boat yard is now being calked and made ready for launching.

Postmaster Wise yesterday delivered to the various branch stamp offices, neatly painted regulation government signs.

Workmen were busy yesterday on the old stutz theatre, getting it in readiness for the opening night next Saturday.

The captain of boats coming from up the river yesterday, state that although it was unusually cold, no ice appeared in the river.

Workmen continue to clear away the debris at the Astoria Packing Co's old cannery site. The wharf is being repaired in various places.

The Columbia arrived in from San Francisco Sunday with a light passenger and freight list. She had but fourteen tons of freight for this place.

The Bureau of Navigation during the week ended January 12, 1895, assigned the official number 94,624 to the schooner M. M. Merrill, of Seattle, gross tonnage 44.5, net 43.90.

J. C. Trullinger's team accidentally fell from the roadway in Uppertown yesterday, and struck on the dock, 20 feet below, with a crash.

Hal Green, a prominent young man of Portland, leaves today as a first-class passenger on the British ship Clackmannanshire for Queenstown. He is making the trip for the benefit of his health.

At the annual meeting of the school directors held last evening at the Cedar street school, a 4-mill tax was levied, \$ 1.2 mill for school purposes, and 1 1/2 mills to provide for the payment of bonded interest of the district.

Assistant Receiver T. O. Lee and Chief Engineer W. H. Kennedy, of the O. R. and N. Co., will arrive in Astoria this morning on the steamer Thompson and later in the day will go across the bay to Hawk.

The steamer R. P. Elmore arrived in from Tillamook yesterday with a large cargo of freight. She had 200 sacks of potatoes for San Francisco, four tons of butter, and forty-five cases of cheese for this city and Portland.

The Potter put a new key in her cylinder head Sunday, and thus stopped the constant pounding noise that has given the chief engineer no little uneasiness since the accident last Thursday night.

The steamer Signal arrived in yesterday from Vancouver with 7000 mats of rice and 30 tons of general Chinese merchandise. Truckmen were busy all day yesterday taking it into the bonded warehouse. Of four Chinese passengers for this port, three were landed.

The O. R. and N. Co.'s new steamer Elmore will be slipped into the water at Portland on Thursday next and as soon as convenient will be given a trial trip. She was built for the Upper Willamette traffic, and it is considered she will be the finest boat on that part of the river.

Yesterday was a big day at the post-office, if the size of the mail is an indication. All the delayed California mail of the past week arrived, together with an unusually large Eastern mail. Postmaster Wise and his corps of assistants had about all they could take care of after the arrival of the Potter.

There is considerable complaint from captains of the smaller river steamers regarding the present location of the stake light at Smith's Point. Formerly it was located at the Seaside cannery but about a month ago was changed by the Columbia. As it stands now the captains say it is impossible to see it on a foggy night, as it is far back on the mud flats. The attention of the lighthouse inspector is called to the location of this light.

Last evening at the First M. E. church a good-sized house greeted Messrs. Bradley and Aylesworth in their pleasing entertainment consisting of stereoscopic views of rare merit and illustrated songs. Mr. Will C. Aylesworth gave a wonderful rendition on the organ, which was pronounced by musicians as a most remarkable performance. "Comical Bradley" kept the audience in an uproar at times, with his songs and musical specialties. The same program will be given tonight, and if the people of Astoria wish to pass a delightful evening, they will not fail to be present.

PERSONAL MENTION. Dr. Jay Tuttle returned last evening from his trip to Salem.

Mr. David Morgan left up the river last night on the steamer Potter.

Yesterday morning goes on record as the coldest so far this winter. The atmosphere was cold and crisp, and a heavy frost covered the streets on the south side all day long.

About the nicest little office in the city is Sheriff Hare's private office at the court house. Within the past day or two the linoleum has been brightened with varnish, and articles of furniture about the room cleaned up.

County Clerk Dunbar and his assistants are going over the old delinquent tax lists and carrying into the '94 book the numbers of pages on which delinquents are found.

Sheriff Hare is the proud possessor of what can be rightly termed the handsome meerschaum pipe in the city. It is a present from a gentleman in Portland who has long been an admirer of the genial ex-postmaster, and known as the "weed" sent him a pipe of unique design.

Workmen yesterday commenced putting in a foundation for the bottom of the new Elmore cannery. The piling are driven very close together, and at low tide were sawed near the surface. After this heavy strainers were placed on top and boarded over, and covered with two feet of concrete.

Out on Young's river the dikes that were broken during the recent high tides are now nearly repaired. Perhaps the worst break was in the dikes between Kimball and Henderson's places. They have been hard at work in an endeavor to repair the breaks before another high tide, and at one time had as many as thirty men working. The dikes are too small at the base and not high enough.

In speaking of the proposed road connecting Tillamook and Clatsop counties, Mr. Wist, a prominent citizen of Nehalem had the following to say to an Astorian reporter yesterday: "I know the country along this coast as well as any man in these parts, and I know that the proposed road would not only be the easiest built in the county, but would be of the greatest value to Astoria. In our county we have the road completed nearly up to the Clatsop county line, and there remains but three miles of timber country to go through in order to extend it down to Cannon Beach. The old road as slashed out would strike the beach just north of Arch Cape, but I think a far better would be found if the road was kept on the ridge, bringing it onto the beach a mile and a half north, at the Cannon Beach postoffice. It would not be a difficult road to build, either, as it is principally windfalls and could be easily burned out. From the post-office to Elk Creek is plain sailing, and all the road work necessary is on three points where a good roadway could easily be constructed over these places."
