DUANE STREET IMPROVEMENT NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, Oregon, have determined to improve Duane street from the east side of 4th street to the west side of 12th street, in the city of Astoria, as laid out and recorded by John McClure and extended by Cyrus Olney, by removing all defective piles, caps and stringers, and putting in new and sound fir piles; and all improvements to be made to the full width and established grade of said street, and to include sidewalks, where necessary, and to be done in accordance with plans and specifications and ordinances in relation thereto.

The lands and premises upon which the special assessment shall be levied to defray the cost and expense of such improvements and the district embracing said lands are described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of Lot one (1) of Block numbered 44, thence easterly along the center line of Blocks 44 and 45, to the eastern boundary of Block numbered 54, thence northerly along eastern boundaries of Blocks 54 and 55, to the center line of Block 55, Block numbered 61, thence westerly along center lines of Blocks 61 and 62, to the west boundary of Block numbered 62, thence southerly along the boundaries of Blocks 62 and 63, to point of beginning, containing Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, in Block 44; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, in Block 45; Lots 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 14, in Block 61, and Lots 5, 6, 7, and 8, in Block 62, all in the town (now city) of Astoria, as laid out and recorded by John McClure, and extended by Cyrus Olney.

Estimates of the expense of such improvements and plans and diagrams of the locality to be improved, are deposited by the City Surveyor with the Auditor and Police Judge for public examination, and may be inspected at the office of such officer.

At the next regular meeting of the Common Council, after ten days from the final publication of this notice, to-wit: On Wednesday, March 6th, 1895, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. at the City Hall, the said council will consider any objections to such improvement, being made, and if a remonstrance against such improvement, signed by persons owning more than one-half of the property in such district herein described, and in which the special assessment is to be levied, shall be filed with the Auditor and Police Judge before the said time of meeting of the Common Council, no such improvement or work shall be ordered in any event.
