If every dollar of silver and paper money should be miraculously turned into gold tomorrow, it would not make the situation any better so far as the principal nource of bad times is concerned. We do not need any more currency, or any new kind of currency so much as we need conditions under which the present supply can be actively and beneficially employed. When the Republican party was in control of the government there was plenty of revenue and no trouble about the currency. General prosperity prevailed, and all classes of citizens were contented and happy. It will not do to say that the sorrowful change which has ensued is due to other than political causes. The thing can not be accounted for by any kind of mathematical juggling. Such events do not come to pass by reason of technicalities in the science of finance, or accidental circumstances in the transaction of the public business. They are produced by general and fundamental causes, and in this instance it is want of confidence in Democrats as statesmanship. 
