Will Attempt to Sail From Marshfield to Europe in a 13 Foot

Marshfield, March 6.—Captain Gustai Groman, of this place, is preparing for a journey to Europe in the smallest craft in which man has ever ventured upon the high seas for a long journey. Captain Broman's boat, which was launched ten days ago, measures ten feet keel, 13 1-2 feet over all, 2 feet depth of hold, and 3 feet beam. The staunch little vessel was made of a cedar log which was sawed in two, then dug out, and afterwards put together again in water-tight compartments She is decked over and several man hole plates in the deck are arranged so that entrance can be had to different compartments to obtain stores and provisions. When he arrives there he will try to obtain permission from the railroad authorities to place his boat on wheels and sail across the continent on the rail road tracks. Olympia, March. 6 .- After four hours Washington; that it was class legislation, and that the railroad employer would have to suffer for the reductior in rates. INDIAN CITIZENSHIP. Habeas Corpus Case was Heard at Pendleton Yesterday.

Pendleton, Or., March 6.—The habeas corpus case was heard today relating to Indian citizenship. Writs were serv-ed on Old Wolf, who is jaller of the court of Indian offenses and returned in the circuit court, Judge Fee presid-ing. Counsel for the Indian court ac-companied the writs with a statement that the Indian judges remanded the chiefs No Shirt and Young Chief to the custody of Old Wolf under a \$100 fine of fifty days' imprisonment for al-leged conspiracy to defy the govern-ment of the United States and for disobeying the Indian agent and instiga-ting other Indians to disobedience. The statement also claims that the Indian court has jurisdiction over the case. A general demurrer was filed by the counsel for the chiefs alleging insufficlency of the return. Judge Fee took the case under advisement and will render a decision on Saturday. The issue turns on the question as to the citizenship of the Indians on allotted land and has no reference to the prop-erty rights of Indians.

HE GOT A VERDICT.

District of Columbia's Colored Recorder of Deeds Wins a Libel Suit.

Washington, March 6.—The libel case of C. H. J. Taylor, the colored recorder of deeds of the District of Columbia, against W. Calvin Chase, editor of the local negro organ, was closed today and the jury after being out ten minutes returned a verdict of guilty. The defense filed a motion for appeal and intend to carry the case to the district court of appeals. The trial has attracted considerable interest owing to the testimony introduced by the defense. Taylor was charged with gross immorality both in and out of office, and with making illegal political assessments.
