Puget Sound Girl In Disguise on the Monterey.

LAWMAKERS AT OLYMPIA.

Are Rushing Bills Through Both Branches of the Legislature As the End Approaches.

REBEKING WITH INFLUENZA. The Whole of Germany Suffering With the Disease.

Associated Press. Seattle, March 9.—Puget Sound can boast of one sailor girl. She was not content with sailing a merchant ship, but served seven weeks on the United States coast defense vessel Monterey.

Associated Press. Berlin, March 9.—Influenza is still rampant here. The Duchess of Sagan, mother of the wife of the German ambassador at Washington, died of that disease today. Two Berlin judges, Weller and Hoffmann, have died from the effects of the influenza. The epidemic is seriously interfering with the business of the law courts, and in several public schools owing to sickness of so many of the teachers and pupils, whole classes have been suspended. In the whole of Germany last week Neuremburg had the doubtful honor of heading the sick list statistics with the biggest influenza, and Hamburg next with 1,485.

OLYMPIA'S LEGISLATURE. A Whole Lot of Business Transacted Yesterday.

Olympia, March 9.—The legislature is rushing bills through as the end approaches. The senate had a busy day and passed these house bills: Creating a state board of finance to consist of the governor, auditor, treasurer, who shall fund all outstanding warrants on the general military and tide land fund.

Contracting with Bancroft, Whitney & Co. to publish the supreme court reports for ten years. Changing the name of Squire City, Stevens county, to Springdale.

Repealing the law for the election of county commissioners by districts. The house bill requiring logs to be scaled at the place where boomed except when sold to points outside the state.

Requiring all county clerks to furnish bonds in the sum of \$10,000. The appropriation bill came up for final passage in the house today but received only 39 votes, one short of the necessary majority of the whole house. Eleven votes were cast against it, six being Republicans and ten Democrats. The vote was reconsidered and the bill will be acted upon Monday when there is a full attendance.

Nearly the entire morning in the house was devoted to the consideration of the bill reorganizing the superior court districts. As finally passed by 62 to 2, the bill reduces the number of judges from 24 to 18, and fixes the districts with the judges as follows: King, 3; Pierce, 2; Spokane, 1; Spokane and Stevens jointly, 1; Thurston, 1; Chehalis and Mason, jointly, 1; Whatcom, 1; Jefferson and Island and Chittam jointly, 1; Pacific, Lewis and Walkikakum jointly, 1; Clark, Cowlitz, Skamania, and Klickitat jointly, 1; Whitman, 1; Walla Walla, Columbia, Garfield and Asotin jointly, 1; Kittitas, Yakima, and Franklin jointly, 1; Lincoln, Okanogan, Douglas and Adams jointly, 1.

Handford's bill repealing the cigarette law and placing a license on the business of \$25 for wholesalers and \$10 for retailers, was passed. Other bills passed were: Prohibiting county commissioners and auditors from incurring indebtedness in excess of the general levy and making them personally liable.

Giving power to auditors in cities of the first to the tenth classes, to transfer clerks not wholly occupied from one county office to another.

TWO COMPANIES OF CAVALRY. Arrive at Pendleton on Their Way to Mission Station.

Pendleton, March 9.—Two companies of cavalry from Walla Walla arrived here at 8 o'clock on a special train and will be taken without delay to Mission station on the reservation, from which point they will proceed to the agency near the station. Indian Agent Harper had been notified from Washington that the troops were in readiness at Walla Walla, but kept his counsel, saying nothing until about the time for the arrival of the train, when he gave the information that he had requested that they come. He alleges it may be necessary to protect the agency and the whites who live on the reservation, to have the soldiers on hand.

This afternoon Judge Fee, of the circuit court rendered a decision in the habeas corpus case. It declares the Indians are citizens under the laws act, and entitled to all the rights, priv-

THE LIBELED OSCAR

The Marquis of Queensbury in London Police Court.

A MAGISTRATE'S SHARP REPROOF

He Takes a Kink Out of Sunflower Oscar While on the Witness Stand—Other News.

London, March 9.—The Marquis of Queensbury was today at the Marlborough street police court formally committed for trial by Newton, the sitting magistrate, on a charge of having libeled Oscar Wilde, in leaving at the Marlborough Club on February 25th a card upon which was written a disgraceful epithet. The marquis declared in court that he wrote on the card simply to bring matters to a head and save his son, and that he abided by what he wrote. Oscar Wilde drove to the police court in grand style in a carriage with a footman and coachman. Accompanying Mr. Wilde was Lord Alfred Douglas, son of the Marquis of Queensbury, but he was not allowed to remain in court during the examination of Wilde. Mr. Wilde was finally placed on the stand and began his evidence with an air of languid listlessness. When he was asked if he was Oscar Wilde, the author and dramatist witness replied: "I think I am well known."

This remark made Mr. Newton interpose sharply, saying: "Answer the question, please."

"Answer the question, please," "Thereupon, the plaintiff replied, "Yes."

The reproof of the magistrate caused the witness to assume a less important air. Wilde continued his evidence, testifying as to how he was handed the card of the Marquis of Queensbury by a porter at the Albemarle Club. Carson, attorney for the defendant, then cross-examined the witness in regard to his acquaintance with Lord Alfred Douglas, saying that he wished to show that the object of the Marquis was to end the acquaintanceship of his son with the plaintiff. The magistrate said he considered the defense to be a plea of justification and did not allow Carson to proceed.

The Marquis of Queensbury was asked if he had anything to say, whereupon he arose and declared that he wrote the card "simply to bring matters to a head and save his son." He added, "I abide by what I wrote."

The marquis was then formally committed for trial, bail being allowed in \$1,500.

KILLED BY ELECTRICITY. A Portland Boy Receives 1,000 Volts, Causing Instant Death.

Portland, March 9.—Edgar Mayer, aged 16, son of Julius Mayer, the well known wholesale liquor merchant, was killed this afternoon by coming in contact with a live wire at the Montgomery street station of the Portland General Electric Company. The boy was an apprentice, and while experimenting at the switch-board he accidentally connected a circuit which sent 1,000 volts through him, killing him instantly.

SAN FRANCISCO RACES. San Francisco, March 9.—"Pittsburg Phil," who won \$15,000 yesterday, asserted himself again today and quit a big winner.

WANTS \$10,000 MORE. Washington, March 9.—The government has made a settlement with the experts of the Cockey commission, which investigated and reorganized the business methods of the several executive departments. J. W. Reinhardt, chief of the commission, has received \$10,000, but he was dissatisfied with this amount and filed a protest. He claims to be entitled to \$10,000 more.

FOR SHOOTING CRAPS. Stockton, March 9.—Sheriff Cunningham and his men are said to be on the trail of the robbers who held up the Central Pacific mail train.
