

THE GREAT WEST.

A St. Paul Paper Gives an Interview of Interest to Coast People.

(St. Paul Dispatch.)

Robert S. Doubleday was at the Commercial club this morning, and referring to the recent interview in the Dispatch, said:

"It was with some surprise that I read in the Dispatch a day or two since an interview credited to a St. Paul business man in which the latter is represented to have spoken most disparagingly of the great Western coast country, and indeed to have pointed it as anything else than what it really is.

"With utmost respect to the gentleman and his opinions, it seems to me to be the worst possible taste to attempt to fly one's kite by pulling another's down. It is not necessary, to admit the truth concerning the newer country of the west does not necessarily reflect upon Minnesota any more than to acknowledge Minnesota to be a remarkable state in many respects reflects upon New York.

"During the past year I spent many months traveling throughout the various sections of the Pacific Coast, country from Mexico to British Columbia for Eastern publications. It was my purpose as well as my duty to carefully observe conditions, and anticipate to some extent the probabilities based upon resources and natural advantages, for the country mentioned and the people it contains. The fact is, that the Coast section is as vast and so varied in its resources, its conditions and its possibilities, that it is easy enough to find certain localities in it that will answer almost any description. As a whole, however, it is a truly marvelous country, teeming with untouched wealth, wearing at all times the verdant splendor of marvelous fertility, while indeed many sections are veritable garden spots, eye alums with which there are none other to compare in the United States I found there localities of which may be said that which cannot be stated truthfully of any other section in America. The people were absolutely content and the grumbler was not to be heard.

"It is true that certain of the larger coast cities are not growing so rapidly as they did; that, indeed, there is great activity in them. That was inevitable, and the cause is obvious enough. Ninety per cent of the people who have gone to the coast country since the 'boom days' of Kansas, Nebraska and the Northwest were there bent upon being corner lot boomers, land sharks, realty speculators, and sitting in comfortable offices or hotel parlors, making fortunes by quick processes, catching one another in real deals, and depriving each new comer of whatever ready capital he might have. As boosting the prices of corner lots, mere location values does not create any real wealth, this bubble soon exploded. Had the people who emigrated coastward devoted themselves to the development of the country, they might all be comfortable circumstances, and their cities would have taken care of themselves as they always will.

"The chief grumblers, I may say are only ones, of the Pacific coast, are those who a few years ago were 'making' a thousand dollars a week in real estate transactions, but having killed the goose that laid the golden egg are now obliged to live on the interest of their suddenly acquired wealth—wealth which, by the way, they have secured without giving any tangible return so far as I can see—and they proceed to loudly bewail their fate.

"Of my personal knowledge there are scores of people who have gone there with commendable purposes some judgment, and very limited capital, and are prospering exceedingly. Indeed, contrary instances are comparatively rare. The poorer people positively are not suffering there as they are farther East and the future of the Pacific coast will make one of the grandest pages in the history of American prosperity."
