PROTECTION IN THE SOUTH

The cry of protection which comes up from Georgia has in it a ring of earnestness and enthusiasm which is calculated to inspire belief in the permanent detronement of the free trade idea in that state. A Republican club of several hundred members, nearly all of whom have formerly been Democrats, has been organized at Atlanta for the purpose of supporting the policy of protection to home industries.

"I am for protection. I know what the people want, and I believe they will get it from the Republicans. We have no force bill, no election bill, now; the Democrats have adopted Reed's rules; they made a billion dollar congress, and they have satisfied me that they are no better than the Republicans. I don't see any use in holding for the Democratic party because they are so badly split up that no two of them agree on anything. One thing I am satisfied of—Republican agree fully on taking care of all American industries, American labor, American land, and American products. They don't believe in building up big syndicates in Canada and dealing with foreign syndicates. It has been mainly prejudice that has kept people from joining the Republican party in this state. The prejudice has died out since we have seen how the Democrats have acted."

The distressing object lesson of Democratic tariff legislation is evidently studied with profit in the South.

That there is a more confident feeling in business circles everywhere is attested by several facts. In the first place it is to be noted that industrial enterprises of nearly all kinds are becoming more active. The factories and mills of the East, if not generally operating up to their full capacity, are more fully employed than at any previous time for more than a year, and the indications seem favorable to increased and continued activity, the only thing likely to interfere with this being heavy importations of foreign machinery. Stocks throughout the country are not large, however, so that it is believed the market will take all that is offered at the prevailing low prices.

An agreement just effected between the iron and steel manufacturers and the workers regarding the scale of wages is to be followed by the resumption of all the Western mills at once which means employment for tens of thousands of idle workmen, and the resumption of the iron and steel industry will bring activity to others. For a month or more past the tin industry has been growing more active, and in lead all along the line of manufactured products there is improvement, with indications favoring a continuance of active operations. We have heretofore referred to the fact of a better feeling abroad toward American securities, and this is being maintained, due to the belief that better business conditions in this country are at hand.

The orders for our securities have recently been on a comparatively liberal scale, and if this is continued it will bring here an amount of European capital which will help materially to the restoration of prosperity. It is to be expected, also, that foreign capital will seek other investments here as the result of returning confidence, so that it is quite possible there will be a return within the coming year of a private sector if not all that has been taken out of the United States since the depression began. There is no

longer any serious apprehension abroad that this country will be brought to a silver basis, and with this potent cause of the withdrawal of capital removed it ought to freely flow back, for it will hardly be questioned that this is still an inviting field for investment, much as it has been damaged by the Democratic policy, and that the opportunities are as numerous and as promising as any other part of the world.

The efforts now being made by the county court for the improvement of some of our county roads under the Cross road act is worthy of encouragement by all who are interested in the development of the county and the building up of the trade between Astoria and surrounding tributary sections. It seems that the agitation now going on for better roads in Clatsop county is beginning to attract attention among our neighbors outside the county, and the people of the Nehalem country are arousing themselves in expectation of the early improvement of the road between this city and Grand Rapids. This week's Nehalem Times contains several well-written articles on the road question, one of which especially, a communication from Mr. Joseph Walsh, on a proposed wagon road to connect with the Grand Rapids and Astoria road, deserves a reading by all who are interested in this subject. There is reason to believe our merchants and business men do not properly appreciate the advantages to the city of a few well improved roads leading in from the country. It has always been claimed by some that this was equally as important a matter as the getting of a railroad, and it is certain a large business could be done through Astoria clear down into Tillamook county if the people had the benefit of a system of road communications. The Nehalem Times advises a show that the people down here are anxious to come to Astoria with their goods, and are ready to do their share of road making, provided Clatsop county takes the lead in the movement. Judge Gray, to whom Mr. Walsh made numerous references in the course of his article, is now engaged in conducting a series of road meetings throughout the county, which are designed to create an interest and afford some needed information pertaining to the Cross road plan of improvement. These meetings have so far been well attended and successful, and have seen the means of exciting much favorable discussion and enthusiasm. Such an extent, indeed, is interest in the subject spreading that the members of the county court are daily giving additional requests for the meetings. The time seems now ripe for a pull together in this important direction, and it is hoped that both our city and country people will lend the aid and encouragement possible to a better understanding and appreciation of the matter.

Through the kindness of Dr. J. S. Bishop, of this city, the Astorian has received a full press report of the new ranspining in Honolulu up to March 1904. Owing to lack of space we are unable to publish the same in this issue. We hope, however, to use it in a number in a few days, as the report contains some very interesting particulars.

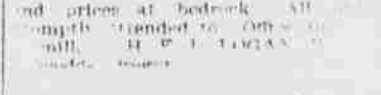
