WHAT RECEIVER OAKES SAYS.

Thomas Ledger. Receiver T. P. Oakes, Traffic Manager Hammond, General Superintendent Kimberly and General Manager Kendrick, of the Northern Pacific, started back last evening from their western tour. They intend to stop a day or two in Spokane, and then proceed to Omaha over the new Burlington route.

Just before going into his private car, Mr. Oakes told a Ledger reporter that the shortage in the land accounts of the late Paul Schulze would probably exceed \$100,000, and maybe reach \$50,000.

"Of course we don't know this from actual figures," he added, "but we know enough, so far as the investigation has revealed, to conclude with positiveness that \$100,000 will not cover the shortage. We are not endeavoring to conceal it, for the business of the Northern Pacific land department is semi-public in its nature, and the people, particularly the purchasers of Northern Pacific lands, are entitled to know the facts.

As payments were made on land contracts during the last four or five years, the money has not been turned over to the clerks, but was evidently kept by Mr. Schulze and the holders of the contracts were given receipts. The payments on many of those contracts have all been completed, but the books did not show it.

The holders became impatient for their money, and their complaints a few months ago were our first intimation of the wrong doing. Before we can know definitely how large the shortage is, we will have to have returns from every one of the holders of our land contracts. They will produce their receipts for land payments, and these will be compared with the books.

"The purchasers will not let anything. The entire loss will fall upon the company. When purchasers present the evidences of their full payments, whether our books tally with them or not, deeds will be issued and the contracts taken up.

"I am satisfied that Mr. Schulze's relations with the Yukon Investment Company are also badly tangled. I have not been investigating them as I have the land department, but I know from certain evidence which I am not at liberty to divulge, that Mr. Schulze embodied a great part of the investment company's funds. How much only careful examination can disclose. That is now in progress."

All of the officials, except Mr. Oakes had been on a tour of inspection along the lines south of Tacoma. Mr. Kimberly said the road bed was in good order, and would be constantly improved.

As for the new road from Goble down the Columbia river to Astoria, Receiver Oakes said he could not speak for his associates concerning the traffic arrangements between it and the Northern Pacific, and it would not be business policy for him to say anything on it, anyway, he said.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

At the last meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Mr. Jas. W. Welsh introduced the following resolution: Resolved, That the secretary be instructed to write to Major Jas. C. Post, corps of engineers, U. S. A., Portland, respectfully requesting him to visit Astoria as soon as convenient to examine the proposed harbor line in front of the city, with a view of substituting an outward gradual curve for the present proposed line from Main street wharf to near the Clatsop Mill wharf, and to extend the said curve north 150 feet to the east end of the O. R. and N. Co.'s wharf, said change being very material to the improvement of the harbor.

The resolution was adopted, and yesterday Secretary J. C. Hadden received a reply from Major Post in which he says: "I am proposing to visit Fort Stevens on Thursday, the 29th inst., and will stop at Astoria as I return and call upon you about 3 p. m. of that day for consultation in regard to the proposed location of harbor lines."
