Along the Water Front

The Manzanita will go up to the buoy depot again in the morning. The Uncle Sam has completed her repairs and will leave the beach today.

The steamer Hamilton will reach port this morning from Tillamook with a cargo of dairy produce.

The schooner Webfoot, Captain Donnelly, left out yesterday afternoon for Redondo with 40,000 feet of lumber.

The steamer Myrtle took a large boom of log to the Clatsop Mill yesterday morning from Young's river.

At the Dalgity Iron Works four new propeller blades have just been finished. They were made for the steamer Franka, now at Portland.

The launch Elida is kept bustling in the vicinity of Sand Island among the salmon fleet, and is doing a big business.

The new saw schooner Columbia has had repairs made to her rudder, and leaves Parker's dock tomorrow for another load of cordwood.

Early yesterday morning the steamer South Coast came in from San Francisco and immediately proceeded to the Clatsop Mill to load lumber for California.

The Mendel brought stone barge No. 2 up from the jetty yesterday morning and then went back for Major Post and other gentlemen connected with the service.

With rice piled up to the roof, cement blocking the sides, and tin plates closely wedged in all the other available space the bonded warehouse looks considerably crowded.

The Columbia went up to the buoy depot yesterday. Her steam will be shut off and the paint on her decks be given a chance to dry without becoming impregnated with soot.

The steam launch Bertie will be put in the water again Saturday. She has been strengthened considerably since last summer and will be a better boat in every respect than she was last year.

One of the busiest spots along the water front just now is the site of Kinney's burnt cannery. Repairs are almost completed and the new buildings will be ready for occupancy next week.

People will hardly recognize the D-wagon when she gets back on her old route again. In addition to extensive repairs to her machinery, she is being adorned with several coats of red and black paint, and the rusty bright lines of color seem to gladden her whole appearance.

People are already beginning to speculate whether the sea gulls will follow the railroad trains to Portland as they do the steamer. A negro porter feeding fish from a dining car window with the fish left over from seventy-five cents dinners would be a curiosity.

The Columbia's regular Alaska trip will be made this year a little later than usual. It is probable that she will sail between the 20th and the 25th of next month and it has been pretty well decided that Captain Farnholt will accompany Captain Richardson on the cruise.

Yesterday afternoon it was found that some bolts had loosened up in the keel of the steamer Ellice, and that she was running over fishing nets and stripping them. She was run on the griffin in front of Dalgity's iron works and when dry will be examined. The repairs needed will only be slight.

Though it is early for sturgeon they are already being shipped up the river at the rate of nine or ten every day and indications are that the number will increase as the season advances. The sturgeon on the docks are invariably the first going to attract the notice of new comers on the steamer, and the speculators as to what they are run from saildines to whales.

If some of the fishermen who put out their nets in the channel facing Flavel's dock, were a little more careful to signify to the captain of the various steamers which end of the various nets they are laying on, there would be fewer mishaps. As it is, many of them sit stupidly and watch whether the steamers run over the buoy or miss it before they do anything to save their property.

The Signal reached Astoria yesterday morning from Vancouver after one of the finest trips she has yet made between the two ports. She has 215 tons of coal, all of which will be discharged here, and 150 tons of general Chinese merchandise. Of the latter, 50 tons is for Astoria and the balance for Portland. There are eighteen Chinamen on the passenger list, their destinations being equally divided between this city and Portland.

It was found necessary yesterday morning at 11:30 to stop discharging from the Highland Home in order to give the sailors a chance to get some of the miscellaneous cargo clear of the cases. All the tin that remains to come out is located right in the bows, and it took several hours' work to make a clear passage. Unloading was resumed late in the afternoon, and with continuous work may be completed some time today.

There was a great deal of interest manifested in the news received in town this morning that the schooner Francis had reached Port Townsend in safety. The wives of the captain and crew all received confirmation of the report and were overjoyed at her unexpectedly safe arrival after so many days of despair and the abandonment of hope. That the Francis successfully battled with the severe storms she encountered seems a miracle to all who know the schooner well. She has been generally looked upon as a bad weather. People will, of course, now begin to speculate about the identity of the derelict schooner sighted off Cape Flattery.

BOND STREET IMPROVEMENT NOTICE.
