In the city jail are three lazy fellows who should be put at work on the streets these fine days. Yesterday Superintendent Chadwick made application for the prisoners, but was informed that they would not work. It is altogether probable that they would not, but there must certainly be some means by which a shining example could be made of them.

A ring in the sidewalk outside the city jail could be utilized for an anchor to such fellows as Hoodlum Harry and the burly brute named Redman, the latter doing time for assaulting Mr. John Hobson.

Over at Fort Canby on Tuesday night the "New Cape Theatre" will have a grand opening at which a large number of Astorians will be present, the steamer Mayflower having been arranged for to convey the people to and from that place.

The "Ticket-of-Leave Man," with all its sensational effects, will be produced by the Fort Canby Glee Club, and judging from an elaborate program just received a big time is expected. But the show is only a part of the night entertainment at the bottom of the program it is announced that a social hop and refreshments will conclude the night's festivities.

What might have been a frightful accident was averted yesterday during the noon hour by the presence of mind of the motor man on car No. —. The car was running at its usual speed down the grade between 8th and 9th on Commercial street and just as it reached the crossing a little 3-year-old tot ran across the track directly in front of the car. With a strength that threatened to snap the brake chain, and caused the wheels to

skate along the track, the motor man grasped the brake handle and gave it a vigorous twist, at the same instant reversing the motor. The child escaped by a scratch, but the parents and bystanders had a terrible scare that lasted till long after the motor disappeared down the street.

The new net tanning tanks erected some time ago by the street railway company just north of their power house, are liberally patronized by the fishermen now, who say it is the most convenient thing yet arranged. The fishermen call at the works at all times of the night, and it is so arranged that they can get their nets in the tank and out again with but little trouble.

Yesterday the 100-horse power boiler for the street railway power house arrived, and was transferred from the Harvest Queen to the steamer O. K., and later taken to the railway company's dock at the power house. On Monday work will be commenced placing it in position, and in about two weeks it is expected it will be in readiness for use. This boiler will obviate the necessity of closing down power and then for repairs, as has been the custom in the past.

It is probable that in the near future Astoria will have a first-class natatorium, directly on the street car line, and supplied with hot, cold, fresh or salt water. For some time Supt. Newell, of the street railway company, has had this under contemplation, and together with the directors of the company, has gone carefully over the whole proposition. Just east of the power house in Uppertown is a vacant lot, 75x150 feet, belonging to the street railway company. On this piece of property it is intended to construct a well-appointed natatorium, with all the conveniences found in the best establishments of this sort in the larger cities. The water will be supplied from the river, and heated to any temperature by the exhaust steam from the power house. In the rear, where there are indoor swimming resorts are very popular, various aquatic games are indulged in regularly by the patrons. Mr. Newell says that this tank will be large enough to accommodate any thing of this kind that its patrons may propose, and there will be nothing lacking to make it modern in every respect.

A day or two ago the Astorian had an article regarding the lack of transportation facilities to Alderbrook from the central portion of the city, and commenting upon it, Supt. Newell, of the street railway company, stated yesterday that his company were anxious to go to Alderbrook or even beyond, just as soon as the people owning property on either side of the new alleyway connecting 3d with Bond street, are ready to donate 20 feet each side, making it a permanent 60-foot street. Considering that the company would be compelled to lay out a large sum of money in an extension of this kind, Mr. Newell thinks it would be poor judgment to start in and construct a railway over an alleyway that is liable, sooner or later, to be abandoned. The company has already figured on rails and other material for this extension, and just as soon as the alleyway is widened into a street they will extend their line to the very limits of the city. By donating 20 feet on each side of the alleyway would not necessitate the widening of the present structure, the only object being to make it a permanent street, on which the company's poles could rest unmolested.
