

Just east of the power house in Upper-town is a vacant lot, Taxis feet, belong-ing to the street railway company. On this piece of property it is intended to construct a well-appointed natatorium, with all the conveniences found in the best establishments of this sort in the

best establishments of this sort in the larger cities. The water will be supplied from the river, and heated to any temperature by the exhaust steam from the power house. In the East, where these indoor swimming resorts are very popular, various aquatic games are indulged in regularly by the patrons. Mr. Newell says that this tank will be large enough

to accommodate any thing of this kind that its pairons may propose, and there will be nothing lacking to make it modern in every respect.
