In 1884 more than 520,660 cases of salmofa were taken and packed on the Columbia river and its be little if any less than \$45,000,000. The receipts for April were \$24,274,836 and the expenditures \$32,952,690, leaving a deficit for the month of \$8,704,854 and for the fiscal year to date, of \$45,217,005. The recelpts from internal revenue for last month show a falling off of over \$700,000 and packed on the Columbia river and its tributaries, the commercial value of which was nearly \$4,000,000. Mr. McGuire, however, has made this question a careful study, and we believe that he can be relied on to bring his own knowledge and that of the cannerymen and others prominently identified with the industry to bear on this important matter before any final steps are taken. The Clackamas possesses conditions that pronounce it an ideal stream for the spawning of salmon, the pure, clear mountain water and the nature of the river bed making it a splendid locality for this purpose.

We believe that the headquarters of the Clackamas would prove a much better location for a hatchery than the one now occupied. Chinoak salmon are naturally inclined to go as far up a stream as possible in search of spawning grounds. There would be no saw mills above this hatchery, and consequently it would be free from the annoyance and damage of rawdust and other mill refuse. And in addition there would be less danger of the fry being destroyed by other fish. The projected hatchery should easily be able to turn out eight million fry annually.
