

THE COUNTY COURT.

(Official Report)

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, in and for the County of Clatsop, Monday, May 6th, 1895, 1st day May Term, present, Hon. J. H. D. Gray, Judge; R. M. Wooden and C. Peterson, commissioners; F. I. Dunbar, clerk, and Jas. W. Hare, sheriff.

Court met at 10 o'clock a. m. and was duly opened.

Communication from D. F. Stafford, supervisor of Road District No. 5, asking instructions as to collection of road tax and also to making repairs to bridge at Wist's on county road, read. Order that the matter of road tax be referred to C. W. Fulton for an opinion and that the matter of repairs to bridge, the court repairs can be made from road fund of said district. It is ordered that the supervisor be so instructed.

Bond of Nathan Kimball, Justice of the Peace, Seaside precinct, read and approved.

Bond of Ed. Banks, supervisor of Road District No. 10, read and approved.

Now comes C. Bradburn and asks the court to remit costs on tax roll of his property for the year 1893, examined and disallowed.

Now comes Andrew Nordstrom and presents a notice of himself and others to alter the county road near Sec. 38, Twp. 5 N, R. 7 W., and also appeared J. C. Rleson and presents a remonstrance of himself and others against said alteration and on motion said notice is dismissed for the reason that no petition has been filed herein as is by law required for the locating and altering of county roads.

Now comes H. S. Lyman, school superintendent and asks the court to provide him with a room in the court house for his office or an allowance for office rent. And the same having been considered, it is ordered that \$2.00 per month be allowed as office rent for school superintendent.

Communication from E. Houghton, supervisor of Road District No. 1, requesting the court to purchase a road scraper for his district, read and referred to Commissioners Wooden and Peterson, with authority to purchase if deemed advisable.

Report from J. H. Hare, Sheriff, appointing R. M. Lowe and M. G. Hardisty deputies to assist State Fish and Game Protector, and G. Wingate to serve panels for committee of 2, without compensation from the county, read and ordered approved.

Report of A. Gibbons, assessor, appointing the following persons deputy assessors to take the census, G. O. Menzies, B. McMillan, M. Gorman, P. S. Philbrick, A. Bergman, W. H. Smith, R. A. Abbott, J. P. Clark, H. F. Coe, J. A. Eakin, and Henry Young, read. Ordered that same be approved and that they be allowed \$2.50 per day, actually employed, not to exceed 6 days each.

Communication from J. W. Hare, Sheriff, stating that the personal property of C. W. Rich was erroneously assessed as being in the City of Astoria and School District No. 1, and that the assessments of Ole Olsen, Annie Olsen and H. E. Sepschown was erroneously extended on the tax roll for 1894, and that the taxes paid by said persons should be refunded by reason of said erroneous assessment. It is ordered that the sheriff refund the amounts overpaid and deduct the same from the several funds on which said taxes were paid.

In the matter of the petition of M. E. Juopper and others to establish a county road. Report of viewers and surveyor on establishing a road as petitioned for by M. C. Juopper and others, read first time and laid over until tomorrow for second reading.

Now comes J. Q. A. Howby and asks that the tax sale for the year 1893, on land in Section 8, Twp. 6 N., R. 7 W., be cancelled the same having been erroneously assessed, allowed and so ordered. J. N. Heckard, Supervisor of Road District No. 5, appeared and reports that the public trail from Jeffers' to Sale's has been obstructed by Jensen, and the court having examined the matter and ascertained that the trail is a public one, it is ordered that supervisor remove said obstructions.

Now comes F. I. Dunbar, county clerk, and presents a report showing that the sum of \$5,842.66 has been collected from road and poll taxes for the year 1894, and paid into the county treasurer. Whereas the court having examined the same, having due regard to the amount of taxes collected in the several road districts, the condition of the roads, necessity for repairs and amount of travel thereon, it is ordered that the following amounts be apportioned to the several districts viz: Astoria, \$1,067.10; No. 1, \$239.53; No. 2, \$184.97; No. 3, \$228.02; No. 4, \$130.08; No. 5, \$247.34; No. 6, \$109.09; No. 7, \$218.75; No. 8, \$146.16; No. 9, \$184.36; No. 10, \$253.34; No. 11, \$222.77; No. 12, \$129.56; No. 13, \$177.74; No. 14, \$43.03; No. 15, \$197.74; total amount, \$3842.66. And that the clerk notify the several supervisors of the amount apportioned to each district.

Bond of J. N. Heckard, Road Supervisor, District No. 5, examined and approved.

Petition from S. Elmore, H. S. Lyman, W. J. Ingalls, and many others asking the court to take immediate action with a view of bridging the Lewis and Clarke river and also bridging Young's river or placing thereon a steam ferry that Astorians may have an outlet for the summer resorts, and the country people may have an inlet to the county seat and market; ordered that the same be laid over for further consideration.

Tuesday, May 7th, 1895, second day, same present as yesterday.

Court met at 9 a. m. and was duly opened.

Ordered that Road District No. 2 be allowed \$10.00 to repair bridge on county road near Josiah Wells.

In the matter of the application of Hanna Paulina Junna for the appointment of a guardian for Abram Junna, a spendthrift. Ordered that complaint be made to County Judge against Abram Junna, that he is a spendthrift, that he will so waste and spend his income that he and his family will become a burden upon the county, and requested that a guardian be appointed.

Now comes Walter Way and makes complaint that the county road leading from Young's river to Nehalem river, in the vicinity of section 18, Twp. 6 N., R. 7 W., cross said road by the placing of a pier, obstructed by Otto Johansen, and the court having ascertained that said road is a public road, it is ordered that the clerk notify the road supervisor of District No. 13 to remove said obstructions and open said road for public travel and warn said Johansen not to further obstruct the same.

In the matter of the petition of M. E. Juopper and others to establish a county road. Now at this time is read for the second time the report of the viewers and surveyor for the establishment of a county road as petitioned for by M. E. Juopper and others, and no objections or remonstrance having been filed herein, the same is allowed and ordered recorded in book of records.

In the matter of the petition of S. Elmore, H. S. Lyman and others to construct a bridge across Lewis and Clarke river and also construct a bridge or maintain a steam ferry across Young's river. This matter being under consideration at this time and the court being of the opinion that said bridge should be constructed across Lewis and Clarke river and that a steam ferry should be maintained by the county across Young's river at points where a county road runs said rivers. It is therefore resolved by the unanimous vote of this court that upon the laying out and construction of a road from Seaside to Astoria in accordance with the provisions of the law of 1893, known as the "Cross Road Law," that the court will construct said bridge across Lewis and Clarke river, and maintain a steam ferry across Young's river.

In the matter of the petition of J. P. Merrifield and others to reurvey, to straighten and re-establish corners and monuments on the county road from south boundary line of Clatsop county to B. Bearman's. Now comes M. Buchanan and presents the petition of himself and others to reurvey county road as asked for in said petition. Ordered that said petition be allowed and that Jas. Johnson, A. W. Meskie and C. Bradburn be appointed viewers. N. D. Raymond surveyor, and that they meet at E. G. Scovel's on Monday, May 13th, 1895, at 7 o'clock a. m.

Ordered that court do now adjourn sine die.

BOND STREET IMPROVEMENT NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, Oregon, have determined to improve Bond street from West side of 42d street to West side of 45th street, all located by John Adair, such improvement shall consist of grading such portion of said street to the established grade thereof, throughout the full width thereof (together with filling as well as cutting) as to all thereof in excess of the balance of the street above the bank of the Columbia River and planing the same with sound fir plank three inches in thickness to a width of twenty feet throughout the center thereof, and laying a side walk ten feet wide of fir plank 1 1/2 and 1 1/2 inches thick on the South side of said street along Block 99, and on the North side thereof that is above the bank of said river and consequently to be graded, and driving piles, laying caps and stringers and planing with sound fir plank four inches thick the part of said street which is North or West of the bank of said river (and therefore is not to be graded) to a width of forty feet through the center of said street upon the established grade thereof, and placing substantial railings upon each side of the improvement to be made in accordance with the plans and specifications and ordinances in relation thereto.

The land, lots and premises upon which the special assessment shall be levied to defray the cost and expense of such improvement, and the district embracing said lands, lots and premises, and all the same are designated as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the Southwest corner of Block 6, in said part of said city and running thence East to the Southwest corner of Block 7, and thence South to the Southwest corner of Block 8, and thence East to the Southeast corner of Block 88, and thence North to the Northwest corner of Block 110, and thence South to the place of beginning, and all lands and premises within such district and not within any street or alley are subject to such assessment.

Estimates of the expense of such improvements and plans and diagrams of the locality to be improved, have been deposited by the City Surveyor with the Auditor and Police Judge for public examination, and may be inspected at the office of such officer. At the next regular meeting of the Common Council following the final publication of this notice, which meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 15th, at the hour of 7:30 p. m., at the city hall, any objections that may be made to such improvements will be considered by the council, and if by the time of said meeting a remonstrance against such improvement signed by residents of the city owning more than one-half of the property in said district shall be filed with the Auditor and Police Judge such improvement shall not be ordered, if at all, except by a vote of two-thirds of all members of the council.
