ALONG THE WATER FRONT.

The Columbine will probably leave for Alaska, via Seattle Tuesday.

The steamer Signal leaves up the river for Portland this afternoon.

The Narcissus will leave down the river from Portland this morning.

The State of California will arrive here this morning from San Francisco.

The British ship Kirkhill left out yesterday morning with Pilot Dolg aboard.

The Rathoun will be at Astoria early next week to load salmon for England.

Two carloads of salmon were shipped yesterday on the Post by the O. R. and N. Co.

The Lincoln and Mendell were both tied up yesterday, the crews of both steamers enjoying a well-earned holiday.

The Portland steamer Pilgrim will complete her repairs at the Astoria Iron Works today, and will leave up the river tomorrow.

Yesterday morning the Signal landed two Chinamen for this city, and discharged 150 tons of cargo. She has seventeen Chinamen for Portland.

The British ship Southwick will leave out today. Captain Hill intends to make a record trip home if he can. Pilot Hill will take the vessel out of the river.

The run of salmon yesterday was again very slack, and averaged only six fish to the boat. The storm continues to keep a large proportion of the fishermen from doing any work.

The Cascades came up from the jetty yesterday with empty barges and tied up alongside Fisher's wharf for some hours in the afternoon. She left up the river in the evening.

The German ship Henrietta, Captain Seaman, 105 tons, arrived in last evening, 4 days from Paita, Peru. The captain reports a fair trip to last Saturday, when the vessel ran into heavy weather and lost her mizen topgallant mast in a squall on Sunday.

Captain W. H. Hobson, of the steamer Edith, informs the Astorian that the flowers brought down by his steamer on Wednesday from Mr. G. M. McGee were presented to Mrs. C. J. Curtis for use in the Grand Army decoration service and that they were a gift from Mr. McGee to the Grand Army post.

Miss Florence B. Moffatt, daughter of Captain A. N. Moffatt, the well known steamboat agent, has the honor, says the Tacoma Ledger, of being the only female custom house broker in this district, and it is thought, the only one on the coast. Her license was issued last week. Miss Moffatt takes an active interest in the shipping business and is considerably better posted in matters of transportation and commerce than most men.

The steamer Mananila returned yesterday from her sojourn in the Yukon, having accomplished her work very quickly. Last Saturday she reached Empire City, Coos Bay, and was bound there until Wednesday. On that day she left out in company with the steamers Homer, Arago, Banderilla, and Blanchard, and the schooner Gem, all of which had been harbored for several days. The weather experienced by the Mananila during the last three days has been very heavy and she was running in a big swell all the way up from Coos Bay. She will start out tomorrow night for Destruction Island with supplies.

The Examiner of Tuesday says: The steamer Excelsior left early this morning for St. Michaels, at the mouth of the Yukon river. She was in command of Captain William Kidston, and makes this voyage in the interests of the North American Transportation and Trading Company, carrying supplies to the mining camps along the Yukon river up as far as Forty-Mile Creek. The Excelsior will stop at Seattle, where extra accommodations will be made for some sixty additional passengers for the mines along the Yukon. She will reach the mouth of the river by the time the ice breaks up, and the freight and passengers will be transferred to the river boats for their destinations. Several passengers were on board when she made the round trip for the sake of the northern sea voyage.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer in its issue of Wednesday, says: "The north side of the west end of the big grain warehouse on the Harrington & Smith dock collapsed yesterday morning at 7 o'clock, as a result of termites eating away the piles, and 600 sacks of oats went into the harbor. Several men, including George Brimstein, the salesman on the dock, had narrow escapes from meeting death, and W. A. Harrington, the owner, was near by at the time, and just a few moments before had been in that part of the warehouse which went down. A half hour before the crash came the oats had been sold by Agnew, Berry & Co., who lease the dock from Mr. Harrington, but whether the sale will hold good is a question yet to be determined. All of the oats were recovered, but it is thought that very little will be realized on them after having remained several hours in salt water. The part of the wharf which went down was 220 feet long and will cost about \$30 to repair it." This kind of thing is getting so common on Puget Sound that it ceases to excite much interest. The dock owners and shippers of this city are happily free from the teredo pest of Puget Sound, with the result that the wharves driven into the Columbia stand solid and firm for thirty years and more.
