DIPHTHERIA CONQUERED.

According to statistics recorded at the medical college held in Munich a few months ago and published in the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, the use of anti-toxine in cases of diphtheria has reduced the mortality in that disease to marked degree. In the hospitals of M nich it is declared to have been reducmore than one-half. In Berlin the mor-tality has been reduced from 41 to 15.81 per cent. Reports from other cities pointed in the same direction and there seemed also to prevail a general belief that no unfavorable conditions were developed by the use of the serum.
