Discussing the intrigues of the silverites to gain recognition in the coming convention of the National League of Republican Clubs, the Boston Herald (Dem.) says: "They start off with an implicit demand for free coinage, but in making it they are only naming a high price in order that they may have plenty of room for an abatement of their terms."
