NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Auditor and Police Judge of the city of Astoria Saturday, July 6th, 1895, at 2 o'clock of said day, for corduroying a portion of Young's Bay county road. Corduroy to be placed at points designated by stakes to be set by the City Surveyor. Materials shall consist of new sound fir, or hemlock, poles, puncheons, or split timber. Roadway must be leveled up transversely, stringers placed lengthwise, 8 feet apart, firmly bedded. Covering (except on curves) shall be 19 feet, of regular lengths and laid to a line. Small not be less than 4 inches in thickness if split timber, nor less than 6 inches in diameter if poles, and if in different thicknesses must be laid by notching over stringers and by adding down, so as to present a comparatively smooth surface on top. The material used and work done shall be subject to the approval of the street department; all work must be done in a good and workmanlike manner and completed to the satisfaction of the street department. All material and work must be done strictly in accordance with specifications on file in the office of the Auditor and Police Judge. The right to reject any and all bids is hereby reserved.
