And this view is supported by the decisions of other states.

In the eye of the law a crime committed on the boat under the circumstances stated is as much an offense perpetrated on the river as though the vessel were at the

When this license law was passed the Oregon Sunday laws were in full force and the defendent took his license subject to their provisions.
