It seems that the report of the treasury officials to the effect that the disbursements of the government exceeded the receipts only \$42,000,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30 last was an untrustworthy one. The actual deficit was much larger and the figures would have shown it but for the fact that obligations which ought to have been putd during the latter part of June were put over to July.

By making the creditors of the government walt for their money the official of the treasury department were able to figure out a surplus of about four mil-Hons for June. Since the first of this month , however, there has been ac-cumulated a balance of ten millions on the wrong side of the ledger. This is sufficient evidence that the payment of debits was delayed in order to make the best possible showing for the fiscal year.
