WOMEN IN ROLLING MILLS

Mrs. Hattie Williams, of Pittsburg, i probably the pioneer American woman in a sin plate rolling mill. Some weeks ago Mrs. Williams asked work of the Monongatiela Tin Plate company on the ground that her husband was ill and could not support the family. She was set to work separating the tin plates as they came from the rolls, in which task she proved so proficient that five girls were put a this work under her charge as fore woman. Now it is proposed to but 100 girls and women at work in the mill at posts where no great physical scrength is required. Mrs. Williams had worked te years to Wittin mills and has experience. She earns \$1.65 per day, which is in excess of her husband's wages when he was at work. It is well known by Americans who have peoped beneath the fair crust of British institutions that British women not only work in tin plate mile, but in file factores, in the hard manufacture o of chese tasks necessarily more unfem-inine or less healthful than work in the box factories, shoe shops and cotton and woolen mills where women have been so
