

One ship from New York saved the domestic Atlantic from being a blank. The three ships from Europe halled from Antwerp, Liverpool and Swansea, respectively. Ar-rivals from Europe this month promise to be much larger. This is also true of the Australian fleet. The arrivals last month from unspecified sources include the Ger-net Hall, 2,186 tons, in ballast from Mexaco, to accept grain charter. Arrivals for August promise to be considerably larger

The American ship A. G. Ropes, while off Cape Horn in the midst of stormy and freezing weather, was boarded by and unusual visitor in the shape of a green parrot. As the wind was blowing toward the shore, which was twenty miles distant it could not have come from that distant, it could not have come from that wintry land, and us no vessel was in sight, the manner in which that bird of the tropic zone got in that icy loctlity is a mystery, and its few words of Spanish, "all its stock and store," cannot make the matter plain. First Mate Boyd, says the Call, is working during his off-watch, teaching the stranger sufficient English to tell the fate of the ship it left, perchance foundering off the stormy cape.

The era of marine telegraphy seems to save created a new taste in the minute organisms known as the "gribble." This little creature has developed a liking for the telegraphic insulating materials, just as larger animals have acquired a tasts for bananas. They find their way in beween the sheathing of strong fron wire and out through everything in the way of nsulating material till they get to the opper strands, when, of course, the wa-er destroys the conducting power of the table. To prevent the ravages of this lay creature, says the London Dally News, the five insulated copper wires constituting the core of the cable, laid across from Portpatrick to Donaghtdee, have been incased in a sheathing of brass, which is wound around them in the form of a thin metal tape. The brass is an effectual barrier so far, but whether these little denizens of the deep may not by and by find even metal tape an addi-tion to their diet remains to be seen.
