THE CITY COUNCIL. Interesting Meeting at Which Quorum Was Present. SALARIES OF POLICE OFFICERS Will Be Reduced Unless They Enforce Ordinance in Regard to Cattle on the Streets.

At the council meeting yesterday afternoon a quorum was present, Councilman Welch being in the chair in the absence of Mayor Kinney.

A communication from F. L. Parker, of the regatta committee, asking to have the streets cleaned was referred to the committee on streets.

The report of the fire and water committee on the salary question was adopted. The report of the committee on the question of hydrants for Upper town was referred back to the committee.

The report of the completion of the repairs made to the roof of Engine House No. 3 was adopted. The committee on the report of the chief of police as to the collection of licenses reported that the officers do not intend to license matter in a business like manner.

The auditor reported that the \$40,000 of the city bonds issued by Mr. Patton were deposited by the auditor on Saturday in the Astoria National Bank. The council ordered that further action in the suit for recovery of the same be withdrawn.

The report of the completion of the 14th street sewer by Contractor Fastabend and approved by the committee, was adopted. The report of the committee that Clinton & Sons had completed the crossing at 6th and Bond streets was received and placed on file.
