THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Straup, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters, with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered: An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English; an advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; a three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer; a course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars, which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from the public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the preparatory department without examination. ALONG THE WATER FRONT.

The Alice Blanchard is expected in tomorrow from San Francisco.

The State of California left out for San Francisco early yesterday morning with a very light passenger list.

There are three lumber schooners in the river this morning, all of which will receive dispatch within the next few days.

The Manzanita leaves out for Tillamook Rock early this morning. She will complete the work of laying the cable to that point.

The steamer C. W. Belshaw came down the river from Portland yesterday with a big crew load of lumber to be used in the waterworks construction.

Mr. B. A. Seaborg is putting his fast sloop Mayflower into good trim for the regatta. Yesterday a new 54 foot mast was placed in her, and new sails will be rigged today.

The steamer Signal left out yesterday afternoon for Vancouver, B. C., with a large cargo of miscellaneous freight aboard, including three carloads of salmon consigned to Liverpool via the Canadian Pacific railway. She has several cabin passengers aboard.

The local agents for Beaver Hill coal have now been out of a supply for several weeks, and they don't know when they will be getting another load. The unusual demand for it in San Francisco and the breaking down of the steamer Homer are responsible for the delay.

Several fishermen are already hard at work on their boats, in the hope that they will be lucky enough to capture some of the prizes hung up at the regatta. At all the Uppertown net racks this cleaning up process is going on. A considerable amount of money will be spent by cannyermen and others in putting the boats in condition.

The Bandville is loading up with cannery supplies for the Bandon Packing Co. on Quillville River. Yesterday a large quantity of cannery machinery was placed aboard and will sail with the steamer tonight or tomorrow morning. The cannery will be run this year by C. Timmons and the Board & Stokes Co. jointly. It will be remembered that Board & Stokes owned this cannery when it was destroyed by fire last year.

The regatta committee has taken advantage of a very liberal offer made it by Elmore, Sanborn & Co. and Harbour Bros. yesterday and has in consequence added another event to the regatta program. It is a race for genuine Columbia River fishing boats, contesting craft to have taken for salmon during the season just closed. There will be two prizes, 150 pounds of Marshall's twine, and 150 pounds of Barbours' machine made web, valued at \$100 each, the winner will take first choice. No fancy sails will be allowed, and nothing but stunnels and ordinary fishing boat sail can be carried.

The steamer Harrison returned to port yesterday from a two days' fishing cruise outside the mouth of the river. She was escorted by the Port & Stokes Co. tug, steamer dealers, to troll for sole, and met with considerable success, bringing in several tons of that species of fish as a result of her trip. The fish were taken in ice and in that condition shipped to Portland, where they will be forwarded East in cold storage, and thence to London. The shipment, which will be a mental one, and the result will be waited with considerable interest. The Harrison also picked up two tons of rock cod, and a miscellaneous collection of hake, rounders, and many other varieties of fish.

The Norwegian bark Fortuna is all ready to sail for Port Price one week only, and will leave Tacoma for Port Townsend, where it is necessary for her to go in order to clear. This is the second vessel that has had to clear at Townsend, account of the lack of a Norwegian consul at this port, says the news, and much adverse comment is to be heard on the subject. The big bark Fortuna is now compelled to go to Townsend to clear, and the only reason for it is because the consul general at San Francisco, for some cause, will not appoint a vice-consul at this port. It is suggested along the water front that the Norwegian residents of Astoria make some move in the matter, and by united action bring the matter before the consul general in such a manner as to compel him to notice it.

The plans for the six new gunboats for the navy have been completed and the ship builders of the country have been invited to tender for their construction. Under the terms of the act authorizing the new vessels, one or more are to be built on the Pacific coast, provided satisfactory bids can be obtained. One special reason why the ship builders of the Pacific coast ought to be able to readily secure contracts for the proposed new vessels is that under the plans they are to be composite vessels. That is, the frame is to be of steel, and the planking of wood. Under the plans the planking is required to be of Georgia pine, but there is no question that half a dozen species of timber on this coast would be considered by the department an acceptable substitute, and indeed far superior to the proposed pine. Above the water line the planking will be of steel, but the upper edge of the wood planking will lap this planking about three feet.

Yesterday's Oregonian says: "The Astoria regatta committee has generously made provision for the entertainment of Portland skippers during the regatta, and has arranged the third day's program especially for yachts and 25-foot sloops, so that they can go. This courtesy has been very much appreciated by members of the Portland Sailing Club, and they will send quite a fleet of their best craft to the carnival. Commodore Taylor started for Astoria yesterday in the Lily B., with Bert Smith as his 'crew,' and W. A. Wyle left at the same time in his new boat, the Tigre, a yawl of beautiful model, 45 feet beam and 13 feet over all. The skippers will sail down the Columbia lastly, stopping to fish here and there. At Cathlamet they will await the rest of the fleet, which will leave here tomorrow. The following boats have been entered: Scud, Dodge skipper; Pug, Lewis skipper; Eys, Dalgleish skipper; Bug, Austin skipper; and Lovlie, Shugh, skipper. They
