The following letter, received yesterday by Mr. Curtis Trenchard, will be read with interest by the people of Astoria: Rosendaal, Belgium, July 20, 1895. 'Friend Curtis: Pardon me for taking the liberty of writing you after my actions, but it is after many efforts ever since the day I left, that I gathered the courage sufficient to write to some one. To commence with, I am not worthy of a distinctly understood, in writing this, I do not intend to play the baby act, or in any way attempt to in the least justify any of my acts in connection with my disgraceful disappearance, but to plainly make a clean breast of the whole transaction to some one.
