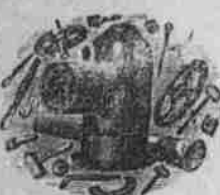

They will remain during the week and will no doubt draw crowded houses, as it has been a long time since Astoria has had an opportunity of witnessing a first class performance at home.

The play presented last night was "Kidnaped," which has a good plot and is replete with thrilling situations, interwoven with humor and pathos. Each member of the company performed well his or her part, and the scenery was well designed and mounted. The play is in five acts and holds the attention of the audience from the rise of the curtain to the final drop. Mr. P. W. Bacon, as Louie Ringgold, the "Duke," Mr. William Burres, as Michael McMooney, "wid a star," Mr. George Stanton, as the officer, Miss Camille Cleveland, as Grace Babcock, Miss Jennie Weidman, as Daisy McMooney, and Miss Virginia Jackson, as Maggie McMooney, Mr's wife, and Fajol, a well made equal hits and received many encores. The following is a synopsis of the plot:

Act I—Home of the McMooneys. The escape.

Act II—Northcott's studio. Scene 2—The escape by the roof. Scene 3—The leap for life from Brooklyn bridge. Saved! Saved!

Act III—McMooney's sky parlor. Scene 2—The bride kidnapped.

Act IV—The old wine cellar. A den of thieves.

Act V—The deserted dock. Arrival of the police patrol. The assassin captured.

"Kidnaped" will be repeated tonight and if the attendance increases, as prices have been reduced to the popular figures of 25c, 50c, 75c and \$1.

## THE SCHOOLS CROWDED.

Large Attendance at the Opening Yesterday.

The attendance at the opening of the fall term of school yesterday was the largest known in years on any first day, and if the material increase occurs during the next few days it looks like the school board will have to rent other buildings in order to accommodate the unexpected influx of scholars. Five teachers at McGuire's school have 35 pupils, while three teachers at Adair's school have 15 scholars.

This would seem to indicate an increase in population and growth of the city and on such a basis the school board can well afford to hire more room and additional teachers.

## MADE A HIT.

W. A. Wells estimates that 250,000 bushels of wheat will be stored at Corvallis this season. ## HATCHING THE FISH

A Correspondent Describes the Process Interestingly.

## THE BIGGEST DAY'S WORK

Why the Conditions on the Upper Clackamas are so Favorable for Salmon Propagation.

A correspondent writes: "Your people may like to know what is being done here in the way of hatching salmon by the Columbia River Packers' Salmon Propagating Company. We came here about the first of June, into the heart of the forest, and we might say, heaved our way here, and since then have cleared away the forests and erected two buildings, each 20x30 feet, and each containing nine troughs 6 feet long, so that the two have a capacity of 8,000 salmon eggs. Besides clearing the ground and erecting these buildings, we put a rack across the Oak Grove, a stream four miles below where we are located, to prevent the salmon going up that, and have also built a rack across the Clackamas here at the hatchery. The first salmon were seen here on June 28th, and we took the first eggs on July 23d. These are the first salmon that come into the Columbia river in the spring, and are in the Clackamas as early as the first of February. They are the finest of the Chinook salmon, nearly all large, weighing from twenty to forty pounds, and that after they have made the journey from Cape Hancock to the Cascade mountains without any visible food. Many may think it strange that these fish are so long in getting up here, but they travel very slow after they have passed the fishing grounds on the lower river, and some of them were seen a few miles below us for two or three weeks before they made their appearance here. We have taken the eggs from about 400 salmon and they have averaged about 600 eggs each, so we have nearly 250,000 eggs in the hatching house. Our largest day's work was 25,000 eggs from forty-four salmon; but it looks now as though the run was about 100,000 for this year, as we will not wait for the late run for it would bring us into the cold water before they would hatch and get large enough to run loose and make the weather and water get cooler, it will take them longer to hatch, so if we should stop taking the eggs now, it will be as late as the middle of November or December before we will have all the young fry turned out and by that time we will have snow and cold weather up here in the mountains. We are, however, taking about 50,000 eggs a day, and shall continue to do so, if the fish last."
