OUR OWN MARKET.

A great change has taken place in the

aspect of American commerce since the days when the United States was regarded as a vast farm which was to furnish agricultural products to Europe and to take in exchange the manufactured goods of the old world. The time has come when America not only leads in agriculture but in manufatoures, and when the larger part of the manufactured products consumed in the United States are made within our own barders. In the meantime there has been a slow but steady decrease in the export of our breadstuffs, a decrease not entirely owing to the increased home demand. Russia, Australia and the Argentine Republie have been making great headway in wheat production, and to some extent by their yearly increasing output. Within three years our exports of wheat have fallen from 155.616.009 in 1892-3 to 118.-720,000 in 1894-5, a decrease of almost 37. 000,000 hushels in two years.
