In a letter to the Earl of Buchan, dated April 22, 1793, says a correspondent of the Nation, George Washington expressed the opinion that it should be the policy of the United States "to be little heard of in the great world of politics." He further observer, "I believe it is the sincere wish of United America to have nothing to do with the political intrigues or the squabbles of European nations; but, on the contrary, to exchange commodities and live in peace with all the persuaded they will do, if rightfully it can be done."
