WAR IN FORMOSA

Japanese Capture Two Cities After Short Contest.

THE CHINESE HEAVY LOSERS. Southwestern China in a State of Rebellion—Armies Said to be Supplied by Russians.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—The steamer Gaelic arrived today bringing advices from Japan to Sept. 1; Taiwan, the old capital of Formosa, and Chang Hwa, an adjacent fortified town, were captured by a body of 200 Japanese on August 28, after a short contest in which 21 of the assailants were killed and wounded and the remainder dispersed in various directions. The conquering army will not proceed further south until the arrival of fresh troops from Manchuria, and Japan.

SOPUS JENSEN TALKS

He Tells of the Evils About Fall Fishing.

SCHEDULE FOR UNITED ACTION. Some Reasons Why the Astorian's Crusade is Going to be Productive of Good Results.

WATERWORKS CONTRACTORS GO TO THE WALL.

AN ARMY OF WORKMEN Will Demand Their Wages Today—Police Protection Called For—Trouble Anticipated.

Yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock the Pacific Paying Company notified the workmen and sub-contractors that there would be no pay day today. Commotion reigned for a time and creditors sought what information they could. The news was not generally known until late at night, and then an Astorian representative in company with Officer Thompson, visited the office of the contractors at the payroll in October were decided by the city attorney to be payable out of this month's estimates and this left only about half enough money to meet the payroll.

INSOLVENT.

THE PAWN-BROKER TESTIFIES. Identifies the Ring Durrant Offered to Sell Him.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—The prosecution in the case of Theodore Durrant announced today that his witnesses will be through with direct examination next Wednesday. The crown has not exceeded that of any previous day since the case opened. The women outnumbered the men two to one. Half an hour before court opened there was even standing room. At the same time hundreds of citizens were held at bay by a squad of police and deputy sheriffs.

TERRIBLE MORTALITY IN CHINA.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—William E. Curtis, well known as a newspaper writer and executive officer of the pan American congress, arrived today from China and Japan. The deaths in Peking average 2000 per day and in Shanghai the mortality is very high. Eighteen foreigners have died in the latter place.

DANGERS OF THE DEEP.

Perilous Voyage of the British Ship Southsea.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—The Merchants Exchange received the following private message from London today: "The British ship Southsea, from Portland, Or., reports that on July 21 she passed through a terrific hurricane in the south 41 west, and was swept by seas which did much damage, throwing the vessel on her beam ends and causing the loss of several sails. On February 27, 1895, the four-masted British ship Stoneleigh, left Melbourne for London, and is now 20 days out. It is feared that the craft, with her crew and passengers, has gone down off Cape Horn. If such be the case about 65 lives have been lost."

There were very few bids and the Baumrose was sold for \$170 cash to L. Poard, a ship chandler. The cargo went to A. Rudgop for \$500.

FATAL ACCIDENT IN TACOMA.

Tacoma, Sept. 20.—A four-horse delivery team of the Pacific Meat Company, was frightened by a dog at the Tacoma Hotel this afternoon and ran away. In trying to turn into Commercial bridge one horse slipped and the team and heavy wagon plunged 25 feet over the bluff side. One horse was killed instantly and another had to be shot.
