THE SKEENA FISHING

An Astoria Man Describes the Season's Work.

FAIR AVERAGE RUNS

How the Fish are Protected and the Industry Fostered by the Canadian Government.

Mr. Gust, Holmes who has lately returned from the Skeena River, B. C., where he has been managing the Anglo-British Columbia Packing Co.'s cannery, was visited yesterday by a representative of the Astorian. He talks in an interesting way about operations in the North. He said:

"On the Skeena River we have experienced three short seasons. Nothing of the kind has ever been known before. I believe that this is a sign of the diminution in the runs of the fish. The salmon we catch on the Skeena is exactly the same as the Fraser river sockeye, and is the best salmon in British Columbia and commands the highest price. We have a small fish as well that runs earlier in the season. It has not been in color, and the latter is most common eating, the only drawback to its success in the market being that it bores after cooking. Although it is very rich in fat, it is not so well liked as the Fraser river sockeye. There has been a large quantity of this species caught during the present season.
