IMPRESSIONS OF A STRANGER

Not a Fishing Village, Logging Camp or a Mining "Hold Down"—Beautiful Homes and Gardens.

A surprise always brings with it a sense of pleasure never to be found in an event that comes before you as a matter of course. The regular ordinary county road of the com- muneplace. Our stay in Astoria for the past week or more has been one of many pleasant sur- prises, for in all ways we have found things so much better than we had anti- cipated. We had heard a great deal of Astoria before we had even settled down to doing ourselves the pleasure of visiting it. We had heard it was extremely rough, one-fourth civilized, the citizens all wrapt in a Trip Van Winkle sleep, the business houses all of the crudest sort, and the city itself a very rough conglomerate, whose component parts when picked to pieces, would prove to be even sordid. The Dredger Ladd is hard at work on one of the numerous sand bars between Steamboats and Kalamia. Several of the canners are taking advantage of the dull season to have the plant command of their established establishments strengthened and rebored. It is rumored that more than one steamer moving daily between the city and Portland will be withdrawn from the route at the close of the Port- land exposition.

The sailing schooner Willard Atwater has come in with the largest catch of sealions for the season, says the News. She has 1700 skins, 1240 of which were taken off the Japan coast and Copper Island coast and the remainder in Ber- ing sea. T. E. Dunn, a seaman on the British ship Whiteburn, fell from the ship this morning and seriously injured himself about the base of the spinal column. He was in the act of sliding down a rope over the stern of the ship into a ship's boat beneath when he lost his grip and fell against the side of the boat and then into the water. He was quickly rescued by his companions. The launch Henry A. Strong brought him to the city this morning and he was taken to the Fanny Paddock hospital, Tacoma, Wash.

A historic vessel was recently sold at Montreal into the Columbia the ship was built in England in 1866, participated for Arctic work, but first used as a transport for the Crimea for troops going to the command of Canada in the polar seas, under command of Lieut. Nares in his famous expedition. She next figured in the Greeley Arctic ex- pedition for the purpose she was loaned to the United States. She subse- quently saw service as a training ship for the royal navy at Portsmouth un- der the command of Captain afterward Admiral Stephenson, and later took an expedition to Hudson's Bay for the purpose of ascertaining the navigability of the straits which she has been doing duty in the Canadian lighthouse service.

The largest cargo she has carried since her conversion into a passenger steamer was brought in from the North by the Danube on her return to port last even- ing. The cargo consisted of the bulk of the consignments, there being 19,000 cases in all, divided as follows: 3,728 cases from the Baltimore Canning Co.; 4,900 cases from the other freight. The other consignments included 6,400 cases of empty tins from the North Pacific, B. A. River, Intel, and Wyanack canneries, and 64 drums and barrels of oil from the Skidgate Works. The round trip was unusually fair one, and was thoroughly enjoyed by all who made it.

"T. J. Childerson, foreman of the paint department at the Peninsula navy yard, has been experimenting for a year in the preparation of a material that will resist the ravages of the teredo in the Gulf of Mexico," says the New Orleans Democrat. "A 25000 sq. ft. of wood painted with this preparation was placed in the hold of construction of the navy yard in the water last May. It has just been taken up and was perfectly sound, though it was covered with little worms which were dead. A similar experiment was made by the chief engineer of the light-house steamer Leased, at Dry- Tortugas, with the same result. The teredo has been forwarded the navy de- partment at Washington."

The schooner Addenda recently com- pleted at North Bend has made ready for sea, and by the time this paper reaches her port, says the Coast Mail, she will be plowing the waves of the Pa- cific. The vessel is one of the finest ships ever constructed on the bay, and is a 2500 ton vessel. For several days the Addenda has been anchored in the lower bay making ready to sail for Coquimbo, Chile, on the 20th inst. She has on board 2000 tons of lumber, and 1000 tons of other cargo. The vessel will draw over 15 feet of water.
