### A NEW MINISTRY IN NORWAY.

The deadlock in Norwegian politics which began last winter and threatened such serious consequences to both Sweden ash Norway has at last been broken. The Stang eninistry, which hung on against its will for months, has been succeeded by a new coalition ministry ecomposed of four conservatives, four radtower and two moderates.

This result was accomplished only after copesied failures of the king to form a ministry that would be sultable to him and at the same time meet with the approval of a majority of the storthing. Reversi mumbers of the new ministry were among the statesmen to whom the premiership was offered before King Osear left Christiania in disgust.

Their acceptance indicates better feeling between the nations. There was a time when Norway's demand for a separate consular service and a foreign minister of its own carried the storthing to the dmit of voting a great sum of money for the construction of ironclads. That was but a few months ago, and it remains to be seen whether the new ministry, supported by the peaceful intentions of the king, will effect reforms great enough to prevent a clash: It will never fully overcome the powerful national feeling that pervades Nonway. A significant story is told of King Oscar questioning a little Norwerlan tad: "Who is King of Sweden?" he usfred, "King Oscar," And who is king of Norway?" "Bronnstjerne Bjornson," replied the lad promptly. "Not yet," said the king, grimty. But he knows the spirit that prompted the reply.


