The new congress will assemble in ten days from this date, and while there will be questions of high import of a political nature that will occupy attention there are others of a non-partisan character that will demand a large part of the

First, there is the general bankruptcy bill, that a very large portion of the business community throughout the land desire to have passed. It was carried in the house of representatives of the Pitty-first congress when Mr. Reed was speaker, and as there is no doubt that he will be speaker now it will doubtless be carried in the lower house again. But as it falled in the senate then, it may do so this time also.

The anti-option bill, so dear to the mearts of those who have jost money by speculation, is likely to come up again, and as it is one of those measures that exercise a sort of terrorism over the country member from the West, who believes that the Chicago Board of Trade is the sum of human villanies-having tried it bimself-it is not unlikely that this too, will pass the house, only to fall however, as it did before, in the sugar trust senate.

The Nicaragua canal bill will also come up on the report of the government commission appointed to investigate the subject. This measure will doubtless be considered with the gravity becoming its

The question of the government's refation to the railroads of the country will extend over a wide field. The pres ent condition of the Pacific roads and the claim by way of mortgage indebtedness that the national government has upon them will have to be deeply con-

BOODLING IN FRANCE.

It seems that one of the arts cultivated of late years in France is the art of boodling. The Panama Canal revelations showed that great advances had been made in the art by men of different degrees, in the legislature and out of the legislature. The shameless and cruel way in which the people were robbed by those who undertook to boom that project will ever be a disgrace to France. The railway scandal that caused the collapse of the late government has been little less disgraceful.

great companies. These formed an immemse monopoly, charged what they pleased, and treated the public in the prevailed upon the government to go into the business of building and operating railways. Times becoming hard and trade decreasing, the new roads, under government management did not pay. The old companies bought up a number and the phonograph. of them, and after getting possession of them allowed them to go into disuse.

In 1883 the government inaugurated a new railway policy. It entered into an agreement with the companies by which the state guaranteed them dividends and required them to construct new lines of road to the expenditure of 7,000,000,000 francs, guaranteeing them a dividend. Here was a chance for the boodlers, and they were not slow in availing themselves of it. Syndicates were formed, railroads were deliberately wrecked, and the government bled to satisfy the greed of the boodlers. It is said that fast year the government paid on clearly manipulated contracts, 234,000,000 france, or nearly \$47,-000,000, and it is asked this year for \$52,-

It leaked out that senators and members of the chamber of deputies were interested in the contracts to a very considerable extent. Acousations were openly made in the chamber when the explosion came and there appear to be only too many and too good grounds for them. We have seen that some of the stolen Panama Canal money was expended in building the subshized roads, so that the scandal bas become a very complicated one. What the upenot of this bad business well be no one yet seems to have the least idea. It has, so far, killed the government, and it will no doubt have the effect of destroying many reputations. But whether it will result in compelling French politicians of easy virtue to mend piseir mays and in making boodling in the logislature impossible is evidently enore than the true patriots in France
