## SHIPPING DAY BY DAY

### Marine Matters, Here, There and Everywhere.

Nearly 7,000,000 pounds of fresh salmon and halibut have been shipped from Seattle this season. The salmon is packed in salted and barreled fish, and the oysters, mussels, crabs, clams and shrimps, make Seattle a great center for the fishing industry. The city is also a great center for the export of large and important proportions in the near future.

The annual report of the bureau of navigation shows that the tonnage of the American merchant fleet is 4,835,960, divided among 23,300 vessels. The chief events of the past year have been the initial trips of the Atlantic liners, St. Paul and St. Louis. The repeal of obsolete laws and the law taxing the tonnage of vessels from countries where American vessels are exempt from such tax is recommended.

The disputes between the Clyde shipbuilders and their employes continue without any change. The builders have lost an order from the Italian government for the construction of three gunboats and twelve torpedo boats, and their inability to furnish a guarantee that they would be delivered at a specified time. The Norwegian government has placed an order for three gunboats with German builders for the same reason.

The roughest weather seen on Puget sound for many days prevailed yesterday, says the News. No great damage was done to shipping along the Sound. The American ship Shenandoah called yesterday for New York, says the Chronicle, with almost 5,000 tons of merchandise aboard. Several hundred people were on the wharf to see her. How she pulled out on her long voyage. One person, however, was not so enthusiastic about the ship. He was a sailor who had drawn and given his advance to the boarding masters, as sailors always do, and then concluded that he would not go to sea. He swam ashore, but was captured and taken back to the vessel. How about the Maguire act, which says no advance shall be taken from a sailor, and neither shall he be forced aboard a ship?

Charters are now being made in San Francisco for vessels to carry wheat to South Africa and Australia from the Golden Gate. Australia has always furnished South Africa with wheat, but the failure of the crops in the antipodes this year compels the Australians to turn importers. Australia has been asked for Balfour, Guthrie & Co., was asked if he thought any wheat would go from the Sound to Australia. He said: "No, I do not think they need it. The wheat already shipped for at San Francisco will, perhaps, supply the delinquency in South Africa and Australia." The new market cannot be permanent."

The new revenue cutter for the Pacific coast, for which an appropriation was made last congress, will be a beauty, according to the plans which have been drawn at Washington City, and every effort is being made to see that she is on the Pacific coast. Captain C. L. Hooper, of the revenue marine service, writing to Senator Squire from Washington City, under date of November 8, says: "I arrived in Washington City a few days since, and am delighted to find almost completed the plans and specifications for the revenue cutter for the Pacific coast. I have been over them carefully, and have no hesitation in saying that she will be far superior to any vessel ever owned by the revenue cutter service. The next most important thing is to insure her being built on the Pacific coast. I am particularly anxious about this; the people out there are more patriotic and interested in vessels built on the coast, and can turn out quite as good vessels as Eastern builders."

The steamer Pasadena arrived at Eureka from San Pedro on November 19th. While crossing the bar she shipped three heavy seas from astern in quick succession. The steamer is an oil burner and carries its fuel in two-ton tanks on the deck. The first sea that she shipped came over the stern and struck a tank containing about 2,000 gallons of petroleum. The tank was jammed back on the cabin skylight, broken, and its contents poured down through the skylight into the cabin and into the galley room and engine room. The furnishing of the galley and state rooms were completely ruined and the provisions and utensils in the galley were rendered useless. The third sea washed the oil forward that had not found its way into the cabin and it changed the white paint work to a petroleum brown color.
