THE COUNTY COURT.

Compiled by F. I. Dunbar, County Clerk, by Order County Court. (Official Report.)

In the County Court, Monday, December 2nd, 1885, 1st day December Term. Present, Hon. J. H. D. Gray, Judge; R. M. Wooden, and Chris. Peterson, Commissioners; F. I. Dunbar, Clerk, and Jas. W. Hare, Sheriff.

Court met and was duly opened at 10 o'clock a. m. Communication from J. R. Wherry, request for an allowance of \$8.00 with which to purchase powder and fuse, for the purpose of assisting the volunteers in opening new road known as Eiele road, also in attendance to assist in filling or bridging canyons. Ordered that J. R. Wherry and S. A. Grang be allowed \$5.00 with which to purchase powder and fuse, and that they be requested to furnish the court with the length, width, and depth and estimated cost of said proposed bridges or fills.

Report of Chas. H. Miller, surveyor Road District No. 12, read, stating that he had let the following contracts for bridges between Hopkins and Vesper, Bridge No. 1, 70 feet long, and No. 2, 25 feet long, to T. N. Newton, for \$250.00; No. 3, 60 feet long, to E. Nelson, for \$200.00; approved and ordered placed on file.

In the matter of the petition of the Postal Telegraph Cable Co. to erect and maintain a telegraph and telephone line upon any of the county roads in Clatsop County; it is ordered that said company be granted the right and privilege of constructing and maintaining a telegraph and telephone line upon the county roads between Astoria and Westport.

In the matter of a bridge across the river such as hereinafter described. Now come M. Grimes and requests that a state be shied across the above named bridge so as to prevent stock from crossing from the west side to the east side. Ordered that Road District No. 3 be instructed to place a serviceable double gate upon the west end of said bridge at the least possible expense to the county.

In the matter of the petition of John Hahn and others to lay out and establish a new road, beginning at the 12th mile post on the county road leading from Beerman's D. L. C. to the south boundary line of Clatsop county to a point on the section line between sections 15 and 21, Tp. 5 N., R. 9 W., and also from a point in Section 21, to a point in Section 26, T. 5 N., R. 9 W. At this time is read the report of the surveyor and surveyor in the above entitled road and ordered laid over until tomorrow for second reading.

Report of R. L. Ward, County Treasurer, read, showing that he had called the sum of \$5,000.00 principal, and \$1,000.00 interest of the outstanding warrants for payment that have not been presented at this date.

Peter Anderson appears and requests that the sum of \$150.00 taken from the body of John Anderson, deceased, by the coroner, and paid to the treasurer, be refunded, the same belonging to him; that Andrew Branch, sheriff, second day same present as yesterday.

Ordered that the request be granted, and a warrant issued on the coroner in favor of Peter Anderson for \$150.00.
