SHIPPING DAY BY DAY

Marine Matters, Here, There and Everywhere.

The Claverdon is ready to proceed to sea.

The American ship Reaper will leave Portland for this city tomorrow night.

The steamer Mount Lebanon leaves out today for China with a full cargo of flour, five cabin and nineteen stowage passengers.

The government cruisers seem to have been exceedingly anxious to report "out-rages" about pilgic sea fishing, but are extremely ignorant about the operations of the seal monopoly.

Some of the missing ships on which reinsurance has been paid are being heard from, while others have been posted at Lloyd's as missing. Among the ships which have reached port in safety are the Saron, 183 days from Sydney, N. S. W., and the Primus, 177 days from Adelaide.

The rate paid for them was 50 per cent, so the brokers who took the risk made a handsome profit on the transaction. Among the overdue list is the Star of Astoria from Boston for Cork; Lady Laurence from Newcastle, N. S. W., to Teopelia; Soudan from Cardiff to Callao; Ancona from this city to Queensland; Earl of Hinton from Vancouver, B. C., to Adelaide, and the Casabona from Glasgow to San Francisco.

The German bark Iron Duke from Hith for Iquique is classed among the overdue list, and 90 per cent reinsurance is offered on her. She is not so very long over her time, but has been in the hands of a disreputable broker in distress of the Horn last August, and the chances are she went down with all hands. The account of the wreck of the Iron Duke was published in the Astorian last month, and judging from the Iron Duke had very little chance.

On August 26 the Senator was on her beam ends, some of her spar carried away and everything movable went overboard. About that time the Iron Duke passed her, and Captain Lewis, of the Senator, says that he saw her heavily weathered and it appeared to be heavily laden. As the Iron Duke was only seven days sailing time from her destination, Captain Lewis is of the opinion that she foundered.

Here is a pointer for the A. F. C. Thursday's paper, published in the Astorian, formed a life-saving corps among the members of the Seattle Athletic Club, and on Monday night the corps had its first practice lesson in swimming tank at the club. About fifteen members were on hand to follow the doctor's instructions, and the tank was lined with spectators who watched the proceedings with great interest and occasionally found sources of much amusement in them. The drills comprised four methods of rescuing from drowning, all of which were carried out over and over. They may be divided as follows: First, holding a drowning man on the back by clasping him over ears and swimming him to the shore; second, holding a drowning man around the arms about the elbow and swimming on back. Third, putting arms underneath drowning man's and grasping his wrists, swimming on the back. Fourth, drowning person still able to help himself, grasps rescuer on shoulders alone to neck, reclining on his breast, rescuer using breast stroke.

The sailors have a grievance against the Shipowners' Association, says the "Call." They say that the boarding masters are allowed the use of a room through which they have to pass in order to sign on or to get their baggage, and in consequence they are coerced into doing things they had no intention of doing. In this room there was quite a fracas yesterday. The ship Glory of the Star was being paid off, and among the crew was Chas. Nelson. Before leaving San Francisco he had boarded with John Curtin, but not liking the place, removed the flag Pedro Holt on his return. He overtook Curtin, so he says, and yesterday, when paid off, gave it to him. Curtin demanded 14 more, and when Nelson refused to pay up, Curtin knocked him down. The sailors sided with Nelson and the boarding masters with Curtin, and a rough-and-ready fight ensued. It was speedily put a stop to by the officers of the association, but Nelson says he will have Curtin arrested for assault and battery.

The Puget Sound towage war came to an end yesterday when the little clipper tug Lucie joined the combination, as the Puget Sound Towboat Company is called. The Magic was owned in Seattle by Captain H. H. Morrison, Bogart, DeGough and others, and her purchasers paid \$10,000 for her. In company with the tug Discovery, which is owned by Rothschild & Co., of Port Townsend, the Magic was proving to be an aggressive competitor, and the big boats sought to drive the opposition, as the Magic, Discovery and British tug Lorne were termed, to the wall, and inaugurated a series of slacking of rates. By judicious management the opposition secured the most profitable tows. The combination had resulted in cut under day rates, proposed by the Magic or Discovery, and it is reported in the latter times often proposing to work for one-third of the prevailing rates, realizing that they would be underbid in any case. The rates tended to bring about cheap towages, and to demoralize the business, but vessel owners were accordingly alarmed. For instance, the brig Courtney Ford was towed last Sunday from Port Townsend to Tacoma and thence to sea by the tug Wanderer for \$5; the Chilean bark Oscar Herrera from Duwamish to Port Blakely and thence to sea for \$25; the schooner Elizabeth Zane from Port Townsend to Olympia and back to sea for \$25. Ship owners and the Puget Sound Towboat Company, in the combination at scheduled rates began to voice a decided interest in the matter, and the Puget Sound Towboat Company, at Port Townsend, Tuesday decided to enter up the opposition. It also stated that the same company contemplates withdrawing from the coast for about \$125,000. The Magic will be the seventh

tug owned by the company, the others being the Wanderer, Tyne, Tacoma, Sea Lion, Pioneer and Richard Hojoko, representing investments aggregating about \$250,000. The tugboat company denies that the rates will be advanced above a reasonable figure and says that the rates for towing schooners and barkentines will be advanced to a proportionate living rate.

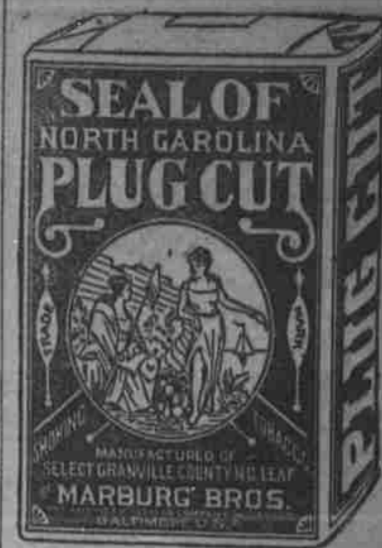
