AN OPPORTUNITY FOR THE COMMISSION.

The change made yesterday in the personnel of the police commission whereby in accordance with election results, Mr. John Hahn retired and Mr. C. V. Stone took his place, will not, we are certain, affect to any appreciable extent the work and aims of that body.

Some months ago Mr. K. E. Ferguson, of this city, erected on Bond street, a well built residence. During the course of its construction it was rumored that the place was being built for and would be occupied by notorious women coming from a lower part of the city.

From that time to this the police commissioners have kept a special officer in front of the house demanding and receiving the name of every visitor to the place, a system of espionage which they will no doubt continue to keep up, and in which course they will have the backing of every respectable citizen in the community.

The house, situated as it is on a street that has up to the present not been contaminated with such vile tenants, is at once a menace to public welfare and a detraction from the value of private property in the vicinity.

The fact that the woman who poses as the ostensible manager of this house was known prior to its occupancy to be totally without means, and that since costlily and rich furniture to the value of several thousand dollars has been put into the place, together with the surprising disclosures as to the quality and social position of its frequenters (as shown by the record of the police surveillance), all give color to the charge freely and openly made on every side that the place is being supported and maintained by a class who assume to possess sufficient influence or pull to keep it in operation in spite of any protest or respectable people residing in the neighborhood and public sentiment which is being aroused all over the city against it.

It remains to be seen whether half a dozen or a dozen members of the community, however high their position in the "social" scale, can thus bid defiance to common decency and the opinions of respectable people. But the Astorian confidently predicts that the police commission, backed as it is by an overwhelming weight of public sentiment, will prove big enough and strong enough to deal with the insult to its official rectitude implied in the brazen pretensions of the arrogant class for whose special and exclusive benefit this foul den of iniquity has been created and established, and that the public shame and disgrace thus put upon the name and fame of the whole community will be speedily and effectually wiped out.
