EXPORTING OUR SILVER.

One of the arguments of the silver men is that the refusal of the right of free coinage destroys the value of one of the best products of the United States, and diminishes by so much the total of our national wealth. So far is this from being the truth, that the cessation of silver coinage and silver purchase by the government has helped to make a market abroad for this metal where none existed before.

In 1890 the export of silver from the United States was but \$4,000,000. In 1893 there was a net export of \$9,000,000, and in 1894 of \$14,250,000. In the following year came the repeal of the Sherman act, and the cessation of the purchase of it at \$20.00 ounces per month. This was an absolute cutting off of a steady demand to that amount, while the closing of the mints of India at the same time narrowed the world's markets that much more.

Each 25 feet front or less (including sidewalk sprinkling) \$2.00. Sidewalk sprinkling must be confined within the limits of the front of the premises for which payment has been made and not extended to the adjoining street.

The use of the hose for sprinkling streets is forbidden under any circumstances. Hose bibs will not be allowed on the premises excepting where hose rates are paid.

For quantities up to 10,000 gallons in any one month at the rate of 50 cents for each 1,000 gallons. For the quantity so used in any one month exceeding 10,000 gallons, and up to 25,000 gallons, at the rate of 30 cents for each 1,000 gallons.

MONTHLY WATER RATES. The water rates will be due and payable in advance at the office of the city water works on the first day of each month (except for elevators or by meters, which are payable on the first day of the succeeding month).
