It has been common in some of the middle Western states to nominate candidates for United States senators, as nominees for governor are selected, by a convention, and the people thus know precisely for whom they are voting for United States senator when they vote for members of the legislature. A memorable contest of this kind was that between Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas in 1858, in Illinois. They were both selected by their respective parties in state convention; they took the stump, debated jointly in different sections of the state, and Lincoln seemingly carried the popular vote, but Douglas carried the legislature. In the last contest in Illinois the Democrats nominated Mr. Mac-Veagh, and the Republicans, while making no formal nomination, were practically united on Senator Culiom.


