SHIPPING DAY BY DAY

Marine Matters, Here, There and Everywhere.

The steamer Queen is due today from San Francisco.

The British ship Drummer and the British bark Auchenloch, from this port for Falmouth, arrive March 4.

The bark Orelia, lumber laden from the Knappa mills for California, crosses out from Sand Island anchorage yesterday.

The two masted schooner Mary E. Hunt, Captain F. L. Bloom, for San Francisco, in ballast, arrived yesterday and docked at Parker's wharf, where she is discharging sand ballast, preparatory to sailing for Portland. She is consigned to C. A. Hooper & Co., and will load lumber for the city.

The British ship Marathun, Captain J. H. Crossley, arrived down the river yesterday. The ship has been in port just four months, having a cargo of 18,845 bushels of wheat, valued at \$75,000, and is bound for Queenstown or Falmouth for orders. She will sail today.

While crossing up from Ilwaco yesterday afternoon the gasoline launch Iris, when opposite Fort Stevens, broke her shaft and blew out the cylinder head. Another steamer was telegraphed to go to her assistance. The launch left immediately for the scene of the trouble, as the Iris was lying in a perfectly helpless condition.

It is estimated that fully 55 vessels, including the steamers of the regular lines, will depart from San Francisco, Puget sound and British Columbia ports during the coming 30 days for ports in Alaska. The telegram, of this fleet two-thirds have as their destination Cook's inlet and its different arms, on which gold has been discovered. The larger part of the craft bound for the inlet are sailing vessels, fitted out and manned by the company owning them, generally consisting of about 20 persons. The smaller boats are being chartered in some creek or cove, sailing with the obd and flow of the tide and imperiling their owners with taxes and watchman's wagon.

The work of unloading the Northern Pacific steamship Victoria, which arrived at midnight Saturday, is going on at a rapid rate. Her officers expect that the cargo will all be discharged some time today. The rain yesterday made the work of unloading disagreeable. Large awnings were rigged to protect the merchandise from getting wet, and chests of tea and Oriental merchandise were taken from the steamer and stored in the Victoria. Of the freight which the Victoria brought to this port are 1,000 tons of general merchandise, 600 tons of tea and 250 bales of silk. Nearly all of this cargo is consigned East. The silk was forwarded last night. The three Japanese and one Chinaman who came over in the steamer will be examined this morning. In about six weeks the first of the new tea crop of China and Japan will be ready for shipment, and on her next trip East the Victoria will commence moving it. The crop this year is unusually good. The shipments of the product via the Northern Pacific steamship line will be so heavy that the three steamers now on the route will not be able to move it fast enough. It is estimated that the quantity of tea which will come through the port of Victoria this season will be fully 50 per cent greater than that of last year, when 20,000 tons of tea were received and shipped from here. The officers of the Victoria corroborate the statement published in the Ledger several days ago that two new steamers have been chartered by the Northern Pacific steamship company to run between Tacoma and Asiatic ports. The Victoria's purser said yesterday that the Olympic, one of the new vessels, is now on her way to China to load tea and merchandise. It is expected that the other vessel, which he believed to be named the Columbia, will be put on the route as soon as the shipment of the new tea crop is fairly under way. When the Olympic and Columbia come on the route the company will have five trans-Pacific steamers plying from Tacoma—Ledger.

Edward J. Fitzpatrick, who has spent over six years in Central America, and is director of a Spanish commercial journal, especially prepared by English merchants, was on the Sound a few days ago and in talking about the trade which has been opened up in Central America, said: "San Francisco has only 15 per cent of the trade, the remainder being in the hands of the English, French and Germans particularly the English, who have the disadvantage of landing their goods on the Atlantic side and packing them across the country, or of the cost of transporting them across the isthmus and reshipping them at Panama. The people of that country must be addressed in their own language if business is done with them. The Spanish-American people have an intuitive artistic taste and a love of elementary culture. To illustrate this I heard of an American man that was shipping plows down there, plows about which there was a great deal of red paint. The business grew very large, and the firm went to a little more expense in turning out their plows, giving them a better surface and a coating of paint that made them look like steel. The firm's business in plows immediately fell off. There is a market there for every commodity and luxury needed by the civilized world. In the last six months \$100,000 worth of carriages have been shipped from San Francisco. Lumber of all kinds and boxes, complete houses and cheap furniture are in great demand; also hats, nails, wire, leather,

paints, crockery, and so on. There is a ready market for canned and smoked salmon; tallow goes there from this country in immense quantities, and lighters, boats, cordage, anchors, all sorts of machinery, sell at large margins for profit."
